

DENTIST USES SHARP CROWNS TO CUT THROAT

SLAYER OF RUSSELL WILL LIVE
NOW SEMI-CONSCIOUS

Condition of Dr. R. M. Brumfield Will Not Prevent His Being Sentenced Tomorrow Under Conviction of Murder.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 21.—Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, who last night attempted to commit suicide by slashing his neck with sharp crowns from a dental bridge taken from his mouth, will live, Dr. Wade, county physician, said today.
Brumfield has a slight fever, and is semi-conscious.
A jail attendant found the doctor covered with blood. He investigated and found cuts.
A physician who was summoned, stanching the flow, took stitches, and dressed the wounds. These probably will not interfere with his being sentenced tomorrow.

MAY MOBILIZE STATE TROOPS

NATIONAL GUARD MAY BE CALLED IN CASE OF STRIKE—NO ORDERS FROM WASHINGTON—THOMPSON READY.

SEATTLE, Oct. 21.—Adjutant General Thompson admitted today that he was making preparations to mobilize the entire national guard in case that a nation-wide strike is called.
"We have our plans ready, and can mobilize at a moment's notice," Thompson said.
No orders have yet been received from Washington, but Thompson declares that he is ready for eventualities.

FAST ELEVEN TO MEET HERE

LOCAL FOOTBALL TEAM TO MEET STRONG OPPONENT IN PRINEVILLE, ALREADY TWICE WINNER—OFFENSE IMPROVED

Predictions on the outcome of Saturday's football contest between Bend and Prineville high school teams at 2:30 o'clock on the depot field are vague, as the teams are considered to be evenly matched. Both are conceded to be fast. Prineville has the advantage of a longer training period, and has already won two games, which should give the team winning confidence. Bend is playing at home, and is stronger than when Redmond was played last Thursday.

All of the local players are in good shape whereas some were crippled a week ago, and furthermore all are in good scholastic standing. A careful check is being kept on eligibility, but all of Coach Erskine's men were found to be passing in their studies this week.
The probable lineup follows: Captain Claypool, right end; Boyd, right tackle; Eslick, right guard; Kohfield, center; Nelson, left guard; G. Blakeley, left tackle; Johnson, left end; L. Blakeley or Philbrook, quarter; Dutt, right half; McNeely, left half; Norcott, full.

Defense Strengthened
Eslick and Nelson are two powerful guards who did not play in the first game. They are expected to strengthen the defense line materially. Boyd, who starred in the line last week, has been shifted to tackle. The absence of halfback Birdsall will be felt in case any of the backs are injured.

Weston Appeal Argued Before Supreme Court

The appeal of A. J. Weston, convicted of murder in Deschutes county last fall, was argued before the Supreme court of the state Wednesday in Salem, reports H. H. De Armond, special attorney for the state with W. P. Myers, who returned this morning. The hearing was postponed from Tuesday on account of the funeral services for Judge Benson, who died Sunday. Announcement of a decision is expected in the near future.

TWO SERIOUSLY INJURED WHEN RIG OVERTURNS

Lucille Kemp, age 9, and Alvin Olson, her uncle, age 19, both of La Pine, are in dangerous condition today as a result of injuries sustained when the team Olson was driving yesterday morning ran away and the buggy overturned. Olson was taking the Kemp girl and two other children to school.

Severe bruises about the head and probable fracture rendered the girl unconscious, and today at a late hour she had not recovered. The boy's case is puzzling, inasmuch as he suffered no pain yesterday.

His chin was badly lacerated, requiring five stitches to close the cut. But this morning at 9:30 o'clock he became unconscious, and inquiries disclosed the fact that he is subject to heart attacks.

The two other children were slightly injured, but were able to walk to their home, three miles distant, for help. The girl's parents brought her and the injured boy to town.

U. S., BRITAIN TO ACT AS ONE

CLOSE COOPERATION IN CASE OF PACIFIC WAR FOLLOWING ARMS PARLEY, SEEN BY LORD NORTHCLIFFE.

MEAT INDUSTRY FACES STRIKE

35,000 BUTCHERS AND MEAT CUTTERS AUTHORIZE WALK-OUT—DETAILS BEING ARRANGED—ONLY 3,000 AGAINST

ESSAY PRIZES ARE PRESENTED

CLUB HOST TO SCHOOL CONTEST WINNERS

Each Ward School Takes One Prize—Meaning of Contest Is Told By Speakers—Essays Praised By Judges—Pupils Respond.

Awarding of prizes to the winners of the Oregon Products essay contest, at a luncheon given by the Bend Commercial club, at the Pilot Butte Inn this noon, was the final event on the Oregon Products week program.

The ward schools as well as the high school took part in the contest, and oddly enough the six prizes were well distributed among the different Bend schools.

Ervin McNeil of the high school took first prize and won for his school a Strativara phonograph. In his comment on the merits of the contest he expressed his appreciation of the privilege of taking part in such a contest, pointing out the possibilities of obtaining a broader viewpoint of business in general, its aid in the study of English and the general educational features of contests of this nature. In speaking of the prize awarded he said: "It appears to me, a more appropriate gift would be difficult to find. Each time this phonograph is played it will bring a thought of the superiority of Oregon products to the minds of every pupil in hearing distance of its beautiful tones."

Thomas Going took second prize. As he was not present at the luncheon the prize, a Jantzer sweater, was forwarded to him at Eugene, where he is attending school.

Essays Praised
Arthur Erickson was awarded third prize, a pair of shoes by the Burman Shoe Co. In commenting on the construction of the essays, Rev. J. Edward Purdy, a member of the judging committee, said that Mr. Erickson won on the great amount of detailed data and the manner in which the essay held exclusively to facts.

Harvey Gardner, of the Reid school, was awarded a mackinaw, given by the Neustadter Bros. Gardner is a fifth grader and only 10 years of age, but his essay evidenced marked singularity, and pointed out many new phases of Oregon Products. "We are just the right age, no matter how young or how old, to help our country, our city or our state. Oregon is our state; we depend upon her for help so when she calls we must help her," was a quotation called to the attention of those present by L. Antles, club secretary.

Only One Girl Winner
Marion Michaelson of the Central school and Hope Shephard of the Kenwood school were the other two prize winners.

Superintendent S. M. Moore, Miss Effie Williamson of the Kenwood school, Miss Wanda Key of the Reid school, Miss Alma Gephart of the Central school and Miss Harriet Umbaugh, principal of the high school each expressed their belief that contests of this nature were even more beneficial to the pupils in a general educational way than many parents realized. Universal approval was expressed by all the teachers.

Rev. J. Edgar Purdy, member of the judging committee, in explaining the method of judging, pointed out that no names of contestants were available to the committee. Each paper was numbered as a guide. He spoke very highly of the type of essay presented and attributed much of the credit to the efficiency of the instructors.

Mrs. L. W. Gatchell also a member of the judging committee expressed a real pleasure in the privilege of reading and judging the essays and also spoke very highly of the general excellence of the essays presented. A. G. Clark, of the Central Oregon Motor Co. presided.

PROHI LEADERS TO MEET HERE

DESCHUTES COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT CONFERENCE TO BE HELD AT THE METHODIST CHURCH NEXT TUESDAY.

A county law enforcement conference will be held in the Methodist church in this city at three o'clock, Tuesday, October 25, under the auspices of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon.

The conference will be held under the direction of Captain Frank B. Ebbert, recently of Washington, D. C. where as associate attorney of the Anti-Saloon league of America he was instrumental in helping to secure the passage of the Volstead act and took a prominent part in the cases appearing before the United States Supreme court as to the validity of the same.

Captain Ebbert will be assisted by W. J. Herwig, Portland, superintendent, Anti-Saloon league of Oregon. The object of the conference is to discuss every phase of the enforcement of prohibition, both federal and state laws. The conference will also take up the enforcement of liquor laws in this county.

At eight o'clock a public mass meeting will be held at the Methodist church, where Captain Ebbert will deliver a lecture on the subject of "The Unfinished Battle." The afternoon conference and the night mass meeting are open to the public and everyone interested in law and order is urged to attend.

HARDING HAS BIG TASK IN RAIL STRIKE

NEXT MOVE IS UP TO PRESIDENT

HOOVER TAKES HAND

Mobilizes Trucks And Food Supplies In Preparation For The General Walkout—Two Strikes To Be Called Early.

400,000 MORE TO STRIKE
Two more railway unions, the maintenance of way laborers, numbering 400,000, and the stationary engineers and oilers, numbering 40,000 voted today to strike, thus swelling the total to walk out on October 30.

TODAY'S DEVELOPMENTS.
President Harding is facing the task of saving America from the great railroad strike scheduled to start at 6 o'clock on the morning of October 30. All efforts at mediation have failed, so the president must take the next step. Harding meets with his cabinet today to decide what to do.

Railroad Brotherhood chiefs in Cleveland are perfecting strike plans.

Railroad labor board members are still in Chicago, although it is doubtful what the next move will be. Hoover is mobilizing trucks and food supplies, and the railroads are advertising for men to take the strikers' places.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—The railroad labor board is looking to President Harding for further action and advice on averting the railroad strike. The board failed to effect a mediation today when union heads "stood pat" on the board's suggestions that they rescind the strike order on condition that rail executives immediately cut freight rates, and postponed the 10 per cent wage cut.

Union heads said they had no right to hold up the strike, and even if they had, there was no guarantee that the railroads would agree to mediation plans applying to them.

As a further step in strike plans, the unions gave official sanction to the walkout on the Texas International and the Great Northern, to occur tomorrow, a week ahead of the general strike "to show the railroad heads we are not bluffing," as the union chiefs expressed it.

MRS. SOUTHARD OPENS DEFENSE

ATTORNEYS FOR THE ALLEGED "BLUEBEARDESS" WOULD STRIKE OUT EVIDENCE ON PREVIOUS HUSBANDS.

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Oct. 21.—The defense of Mrs. Lydia Southard, alleged "bluebeardess" opened its case today by urging approval of four motions of strike out evidence pertaining to the deaths of Mrs. Southard's three previous husbands. The prosecution rested yesterday.

CONSIDERATION OF REQUEST ASSURED

Assurance that the Bend Commercial club's request that there be no protective tariff on lath and shingles will receive consideration, was received by the club this morning from Representative N. J.
