he understood that considerable liquor was being dispensed in the card rooms. Baker declared that he had condemned previous administrations for not stopping conditions similar to those that now prevail.

**Plan to Check Speeding**  
 "Men are losing money they can ill afford," he declared. Mayor Gilson said that one man had bragged of winning \$700 in ten days. Gilson was doubtful as to whether the public would support the city officials in a campaign to clean up gambling, but said that it should be done.

Objection to the "drunk and disorderly" ordinance was voiced by Baker. He urged that the city pass an ordinance, in conformity to the state law, making mere drunkenness a misdemeanor. It was also suggested that an ordinance be passed denying the defendant in such cases the right to a jury trial.

In response to a letter from Sam A. Kozar, secretary of State, asking for suggestions as to possible means of curbing the speed mania, which he admits is on the increase, Baker outlined a program as follows: first offense, fine; second offense, fine and imprisonment; third offense, revoke license.

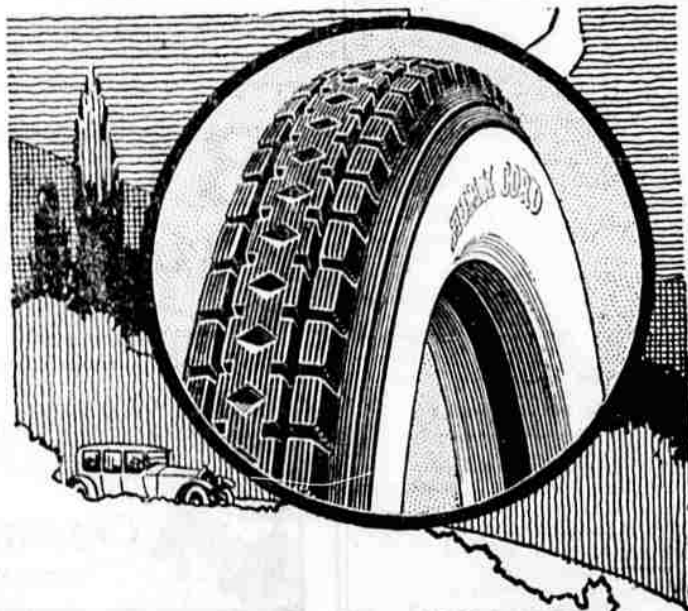

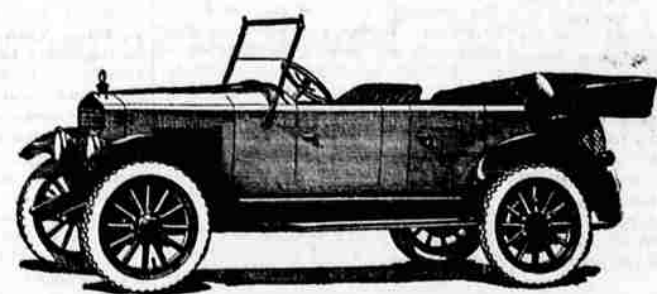
