RAILROAD BUILDER SUING FOR \$472,000

Strahorn Alleges Only \$100,000 Out of \$600,000 Paid Him For Franchises and Property Rights.

PORTLAND, Dec. 31 .- Robert E. Strahorn is the plaintiff in a suit filed here to recover \$472,000 from Oregon-California & Eastern Railroad Company. The plaintiff, in his allegations, sets forth that only some \$100,000 of a \$600,000 contract entered into with the railroad in May, 1919, whereby certain franchises and property rights of the plaintiff were to be transferred to the company, was paid to him.

The defendant, represented by James G. Wilson, contends that an amendment made to the Interstate commerce act, effective June 20 1920, prohibited such a transaction.
