FORCE THEM OUT

In the past few years there have appeared among the magazines on sale at the news stands a number of paper back booklets issued monthly or oftener and containing suggestive stories, verses and pictures. Because of the nature of the contents these publications have been distributed almost exclusively by the express companies, the regulations against circulation of certain kinds of printed matter being such as to bar them from the United States mails.

This fact alone, that is, that these magazines cannot use the mails, is enough to indicate their character and yet when they reach their point of distribution, by whatever means used, they are placed on sale to all, young or old. Older readers may not be harmed by reading them though they are certainly not benefited, but young people distinctly are harmed. They purchase these booklets secretly, read them in the secrecy of their rooms and then pass them on in secret to their friends. No one will deny, we think, that what young people find it necessary to read in secret ought not to be read at all.

The Bulletin ventures the opinion that newsdealers ought to give up the sale of this sort of salacious trash. If all are not willing to do so there is every reason why the Civic league, the Commercial club, the churches and every other organization interested in the improvement of Bend should take action to keep these offensive magazines out of town.

WILL SEE ECLIPSE FROM LONELY ISLE

Royal Observatory At Greenwich To Send Expedition To Christmas Island To Observe Phenomenon.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Christmas Island, in the Indian Ocean, one of the several bits of land that lonely voyagers have come upon in the holiday season and have named accordingly, may play an important part in the further checking up of the Einstein theory, according to reports from London.

The Royal Observatory at Greenwich is planning to send to the tiny island shortly an expedition equipped with good-sized telescopes to observe next September's total eclipse of the sun. A Dutch astronomical party may also install its instruments there.

SAYS CLOTHES ARE A WASTE OF TIME

Ten Years of Woman's Life Spent In Putting On and Taking Off Garments, Declares Dean.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) LONDON, Jan. 13.—Ten years of a woman's life is spent in putting on and taking off her clothes, according to the Dean of St. Paul's. Man, according to Dean Inge, wastes but two of his years bothering about with his raiment.

Twin Highwaymen of the Sea.
Ice and fog are known as the "twin highwaymen of the sea." The steamer routes are regularly patrolled and a constant watch maintained for icebergs, and when they are discovered the news is scattered broadcast by wireless.

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Terrace Registration System.

This is a system of registration of titles to real estate introduced by Sir Robert Torrens in Australia, and bears his name. This system of official examination and registration of titles has been adopted in Australia, England, New Zealand, British Columbia and parts of Canada. In a modified form it is used in several states of the Union, in Hawaii and in the Philippines.

The Seven Sleepers.

The story concerns seven Christian youths of Ephesus, imprisoned by order of the Emperor Decius in a cave in which they sought refuge, and where they fell asleep for nearly 200 years, awaking to find a new civilization. They then related their story to the multitude, gave them their benediction, and expired. The Church consecrated June 27 to their memory.

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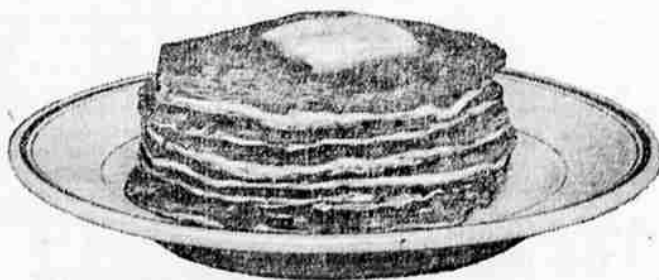
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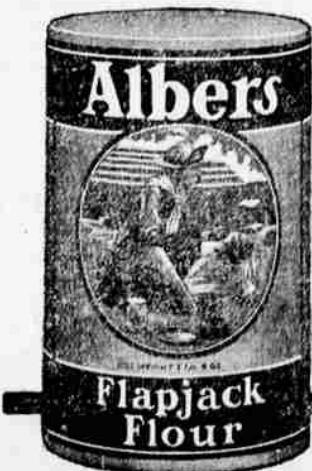


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Silent Adoration.
