**FOREIGNERS DEMAND U. S. SPORTING GOODS**

**Success of American Tennis Teams Gives Manufacturers Lead Despite Higher Prices.**

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Increasing world wide popularity of all athletic sports is reflected by official figures of the department of commerce showing an ever increasing amount of exports of American sporting goods.  
 As a result of the recent successes of American Davis cup teams, tennis goods are in greater demand than those for any other sport at the present time.  
 Sporting goods manufacturers in England and Germany are striving for the world's markets and they have a favorable situation on exchange rates. As a result they are commanding many of the cheaper markets, but American goods are superior and command the respect of those able to pay, and the leaders in various lines of sports.  
 American consuls were recently asked for reports on the development of athletic sports in the countries to which they are accredited, and the markets for American goods.

**MISSOURI PLANS SCENIC HIGHWAY**

**150 Mile Boulevard System To Be Constructed Will Connect Many Lakes And Parks.**

 SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 20.—Plans have been laid for a 150 mile scenic highway, said to be the first project of its kind ever undertaken in America, connecting all points of historic interest and special scenic beauty in and near Springfield.  
 Instead of contemplating the construction of a completely new boulevard system, it utilizes such roads and highways as already exist. By arousing the interest of owners of show places in and near the city and with private and public subscription, these places are to be connected by a network of boulevards.  
 On the routes will be a water frontage of from 25 to 50 miles. Many lakes and parks are in the plan.

**The Bitter End.**  
 The expression "bitter end," as when one says, "I will follow it to the bitter end," is a nautical term, borrowed from a ship's cable. If you have ever been on a big ship you must have noticed two big pieces of wood sticking up out of the deck forward, alongside each other. They sometimes have a windlass between them, and they are used to secure the cable that goes to the anchor. These pieces of wood are called the bits. When the ship comes to anchor the cable is paid out all that part of it which is abaft or behind the bits is called the bitter end of the cable. In a storm or in poor holding ground for anchors the more cable that is paid out the better the anchor will hold, and when the captain is at all doubtful, he pays out his cable to the bitter end sooner than risk any harm to his ship.

**DUCKS HIDE LAKES NEAR TEXAS TOWN**

**cause the German trade challenge Bodies of Water—Hunters Helpless Without Blinds.**

 LUBBOCK, Texas, Jan. 21.—If a duck occupies two square feet of space, how many ducks will it take to completely hide the water in a lake three hundred yards wide by nine hundred and fifty yards long?  
 On one morning's drive twenty lakes can be found in the South Plains section around this town that will have from 1,000 to 18,000 ducks on them. When these flocks leave the water, they drench you as with a heavy summer shower with the water that falls from their feathers and make a roar that can be heard a half mile.  
 The lakes are surrounded for two miles with an absolute level plain and without a blind it is practically impossible to get a shot at the ducks.

**Early Umbrellas.**  
 Among the Greeks and Romans umbrellas were carried solely by women, and it was regarded as effeminate for a man to carry one.  
 The use of umbrellas became very general in Italy and France in the Sixteenth century.  
 Early in the Eighteenth century it was the practice to keep umbrellas in the coffee houses as a protection to guests caught in an unexpected shower.

At length there arose a man who flouted public ridicule and became a devotee to the umbrella. He was Jonas Hanway, a traveler. He had an extraordinary big and stout one made for his own use. For 30 years Hanway and his umbrella were a familiar figure along the Strand, and many a shot of ridicule was fired at him. He died in 1786, but lived long enough to see his example commonly followed.

**Curious Irish Vault.**  
 In a quiet back street of Dublin is the Church of St. Michan's, and in its vaults may be seen one of the strangest sights of the country. There lie the bodies of people buried centuries ago, which, owing to some curious preservative properties of the air or soil of that particular place, never decay. Their skins "tan" into a flexible chamois-like leather. The limbs can be moved about with ease, the finger nails are perfect, and in some cases the features are fairly distinct. This is especially the case with the body of an infant, buried in 1099. There is in another vault a body said to be that of a Crusader, and in another one said to be that of a brother of King O'Toole. One very gruesome sight is that of the headless bodies of two unfortunate who were beheaded during the famous rebellion of '98.

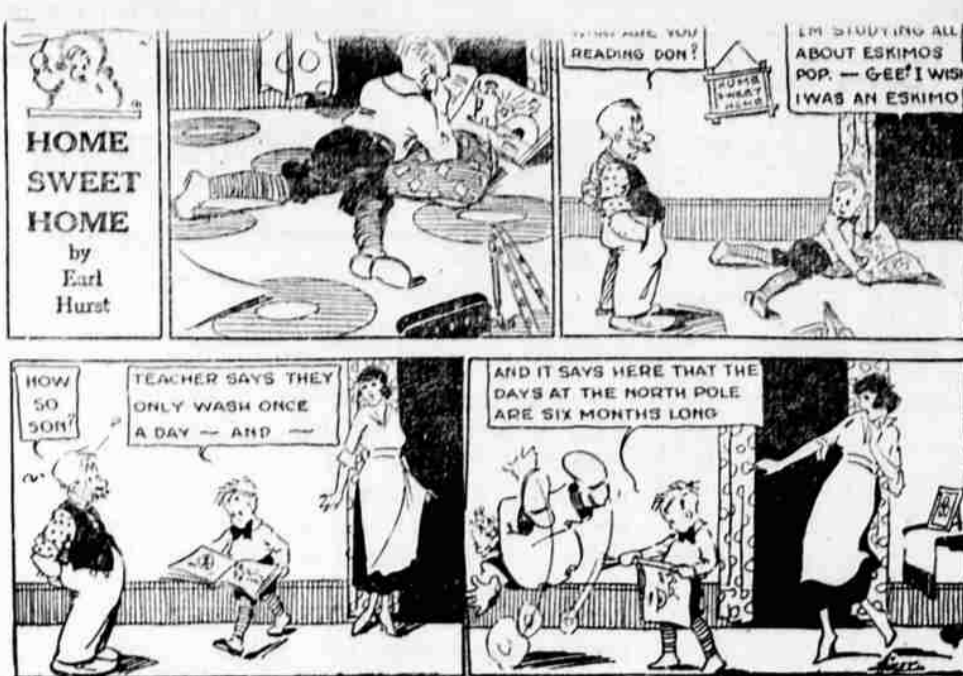
**Backstops Have Best Chance of Staying In Game After Legs Give Out, Figures Show.**
