FOREIGNERS IN JAPAN HARD HIT BY DOUBLING OF CHARGE - EXPORTERS AND IMPORT-ERS PROTEST.

> By Clarence Dubose (United Press Staff Correspondent.)

TOKIO, Feb. 9 .- Foreigners in Ja pan are holding grouchfests over the stiff boost in outgoing mail rates which recently became effective.

Postage was doubled on all foreign

Exports and importers have filed formal protests and some of the trade journals have complained that Japan's already languishing foreign trade will get another joit because of these new rates.

They contend that the sending of Brooks-Scanlon plant team on the trade catalogues, samples of materials and trade stimulation literature and letters will be discouraged because of the steep postage "over head.

> The minimum regular-letter postage to the United States or other foreign countries is now twenty sen. or ten cents. This is twice the rate from the United States to Japan.

The postal authorities point to the authorization or agreement of the Madrid international postal convention last year for the postage increase. They express the utmost regret for any unfavorable foreign trade reaction that may result—but vigorously deny that such an outcome is probable.
