

STATE CAVALRY PATROL SCENE OF MOB ATTACK

THOUSANDS RUSH MILL
AT PONTIAC, R. I.

WOMEN AID IN BATTLE

All Available Militia Called Out By
Governor To Restore Order After
Disturbances Growing Out
of Textile Strike.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.)

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Feb. 21.—Following an attack on the Knight mill at Pontiac by strikers, state cavalrymen are patrolling Pawtucket valley today.

Thousands of strikers, including many women, advanced on the mill and smashed windows and doors. Cavalry were ordered to clear the streets of strikers armed with clubs and stones.

Governor E. J. San Souci has called out all the available state militia to restore order in the Blackstone and Pawtucket valleys. Battery B, 103rd Field Artillery is armed with machine guns and in readiness.

Two are dead and 20 injured as the result of a pitched battle of strikers and police at Pawtucket.

RIOT GUNS USED

PAWTUCKET, R. I., Feb. 21.—One was killed and several were wounded today when police used riot guns on a crowd of striking textile workers. The riot act was read.

LIBERALS WILL TRY POLITICS

PLAN TO "STEAL" CONGRESS AT
PRIMARY ELECTIONS—COALITION
ORGANIZATION TO ENTER CAMPAIGN.

STAGE BATTLES THROUGH HEAVY SNOW TO SOUTH

Conditions on the roads south of Bend are the worst in years, according to L. J. Harriman, driver of the Silver Lake stage, who started out again this forenoon with mail and passengers after an eventful trip which began Sunday morning and ended this morning at 4 o'clock. He was on the road from La Pine to Bend since 10 o'clock last night.

The stage was only able to get as far as Summit station, 42 miles this side of Fort Rock, Sunday, but Harriman said he hoped to reach Fremont on the present attempt.

The snow is 18 inches deep at La Pine, and deepens from that point, being from 4 to 8 feet deep in places. Mail is being taken in sleighs from Summit station to Fort Rock, and from there, up to this week, it has been possible to go by car, said Harriman.

Perry Smith, B. McGinty, M. Tello and Tom Petrich were the passengers this morning for Fort Rock and Silver Lake. Dr. R. H. Parsons started for Paisley.

CALIFORNIA GRAPE INDUSTRY RETURNS

Farmers Who Destroyed Vines At
Beginning of Prohibition Era,
Find Demand Still Good.

CONCORD, Cal., Feb. 21.—Scores of farmers of this district, after having pulled out their grape vines at the commencement of the era of prohibition, are again planting grapes on their property.

This unusual condition is prevailing throughout Contra Costa county because of the fabulous prices commanded by wine grapes since Mr. Volstead consented to make the country dry. Because of the seeming unabated demands for grapes, growers are renewing the crop once destroyed in the belief that the Volstead act spelled ruin for their properties.

REPORT MAHAFFEY IS OUT OF DANGER

E. P. Mahaffey, vice-president and manager of the Central Oregon bank, who for several days past has been critically ill at his rooms at the Benson hotel in Portland, is now out of danger according to reports brought to Bend last night by C. T. Terrill on his return from a trip to Portland. It will be a matter of several weeks, it is expected, before the patient will have regained his strength sufficiently to allow his being brought home.

PER CAPITA POWER USE GREATEST HERE

The largest per capita use of electricity of any city in the United States is to be found in Bend, according to figures gathered by T. H. Foley, general manager of the Bend Water, Light & Power Co., and Kemper B. Miller, director, during Miller's visit here from the east recently. Foley was incorrectly quoted yesterday as saying that the use here was the lightest per capita.

IRISH GATHER TO CONSIDER TREATY

COAL MEN WILL MEET WORKERS ON WAGE ISSUE

ANTHRACITE CHIEFS
RECOGNIZE CALL

OHIO GIVES REFUSAL

First Organization To Abrogate
Wage Contract With Miners Sees
No Reason To Change
Original Position.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 21.—Anthracite coal operators today officially announced their willingness to meet union miners' representatives to discuss the workers' demands.

Operators will meet Friday at Atlantic City for an intensive preparation for negotiations.

LEWIS ISSUES CALL

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—President Lewis issued a call today for a conference of miners and operators. He requested that a committee of two operators and two miners from each state in the central competitive field meet to draw a new scale.

TURN DOWN INVITATION

COLUMBUS, Feb. 21.—Officials of the Southern Ohio Coal Exchange say that Ohio operators will refuse Lewis' conference invitation. This was the first organization to abrogate the wage agreement. Officials saw no reason to change their position.

MCCARTHY GETS YEAR SENTENCE

COURT BLAMES MERCHANTS FOR
FAILURE TO INVESTIGATE
CHECKS—FINDS CRIME WAVE
CAUSE IN PARENTAL NEGLECT

J. J. McCarthy, who pleaded guilty last week to a charge of forgery, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary this morning when he appeared before Circuit Judge T. E. J. Duffy. McCarthy stated that he had made good the amount lost through his crime, but the court pointed out that no attempt at restitution had been made until after the arrest, and that in consequence this constituted no cause why sentence should not be imposed.

That the business man who accepts a check on which there exists any doubt, without investigation, is assisting young men to crime, was Judge Duffy's declaration when he passed sentence. Merchants have it in their power to prevent forgery and passing of worthless checks, he emphasized.

Later Judge Duffy expressed his belief that the wave of crime, chiefly involving the younger generation, is the result of parental negligence and lack of proper early training in the home.

POSTOFFICE WILL OBSERVE HOLIDAY

Deliveries To Be Made Only In Case
of Perishables—Banks To Re-
main Closed All Day.

Washington's birthday will be observed by the Bend postoffice tomorrow, all carrier and window deliveries being ordered suspended for the day with the exception of perishables. Postmaster W. H. Hudson states. Box and outgoing mail will be distributed as usual.

Both banks will be closed for the entire day.

TELLS VALUES OF JUNIOR CHAMBER

L. Anties, secretary of the Bend Commercial club, this afternoon addressed the Bend high school assembly on the purposes and value of a Junior Chamber of Commerce, which may be organized soon in the high school.

Early Settlers' Abandoned Cabins On Desert Claimed By Jackrabbits During Storm; Bad Drifts Reported

Cabins of early homesteaders on the high desert, empty for years, are deserted no longer. They have been appropriated by the jackrabbit. Since the coming of the heavy snow Sunday, desolate shacks, abandoned by man, have furnished shelter to hundreds of long eared rodents. County School Superintendent J. Alton Thompson reported this morning following a trip to the Grinstead ranch 32 miles east of Bend.

Scores of "jacks" were congregating about nearly every empty cabin along the way, Thompson said. Not only that, but they were actually taking up their abode in the houses wherever unglazed windows or broken doors permitted them to enter. The existence of these abandoned homes has saved jackrabbit lives the number of which would be impossible to estimate, Thompson believes.

Snow has drifted to a depth of from three to four feet in many places, and the Brothers stage was compelled to make a wide detour to get through. The county superintendent, accompanied by his daughter Mary, instructor at the Millican school, was forced to walk the last mile and one-quarter, the car being unable to make its way through the increasingly difficult snow blockade.

Birth Control Head Permitted To Enter Japan

CRITICISM OF BEND ALLAYED

REDMOND ROAD DELEGATION
LEAVES WITH ASSURANCE OF
FAIRNESS IN THE USE OF
ROAD FUNDS.

With the feeling that there has been no endeavor on the part of Bend to secure an unfair share of road construction and improvement in the county, Redmond roads enthusiasts who met here yesterday afternoon with highway committee members of the Bend Commercial club, returned to their homes last night. Bend members of the conference expressed their surprise at the existence of any feeling that Bend might have been favored, stating that criticisms which they had heard were to the effect that Redmond had been given the better of it.

M. A. Lynch of the Redmond delegation, stated that as a last result in securing construction of the four mile stretch of highway between Redmond and Cline Falls, he would advocate the use of funds intended for The Dalles-California highway.

County Judge R. W. Sawyer, who attended the meeting, left last night for Portland to submit the question of whether The Dalles-California work should be continued, or the Redmond-Sisters road finished, to the state highway commission.

APPRAISALS BACK FOR BONUS LOANS

Two former sailors and one soldier, among the oldest ex-service men in Bend in terms of residence, are the first to receive their appraisals sent in on property offered as security for the state bonus loan. Ray Jackson is the first, John Steidl, jr., the second, and Fred Triplett third, according to the numbering of the appraisal papers, all of which were returned this morning.

28 ARE KILLED WHEN GAS BAG BURSTS IN AIR

SPEED SOUGHT WITH
ITALIAN SHIP

HELIUM GAS REMOVED

Ordinary Field Gas Used To Replace
Expensive Element — Roma's
New Motors Had First Trial
On Death Flight.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 21.—Twenty-eight were killed and 10 severely injured when the dirigible, Roma, exploded over Langley field at 2 o'clock this afternoon. All the injured have been removed to the army base hospital.

The big dirigible, purchased from Italy, was making a series of test flights, intending to attempt to make a speed record.

Saturday naval authorities ordered the helium gas removed from the Roma and stored, as the ship contained the total supply of helium in the country. The ordinary field gas used by balloons was substituted.

The original Italian engines refused to function in cold weather, and Liberty motors were substituted in December. Today was the first trip of the new motors.

ILLNESS AIDS HABEAS CORPUS

EFFORTS TO RUSH TACOMA
BANKER OUT OF CALIFORNIA
ON EXTRADITION BLOCKED
BY PHYSICIAN'S CERTIFICATE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21.—Efforts to arrest Jafet Lindeberg, Tacoma banker, and rush him across the state line on a warrant issued after extradition, were frustrated early this morning. Governor Stephens issued a warrant returnable today.

Deputy District Attorney Roubush, of Pierce county, Washington planned to arrest Lindeberg, wanted in Tacoma on a charge of defrauding depositors and stockholders of the Scandinavian bank, in order to prevent habeas corpus proceedings from delaying extradition.

Lindeberg was ill in bed with a physician's certificate that he could not be moved. The warrant was served, but habeas corpus proceedings will be immediately instituted.
