

CRITICS FEEL HUGHES' LASH IN PACT FIGHT

Letter To Lodge Denies Any
Secret Agreement

DELEGATES DEFENDED

Secretary Hopes Honor of Americans
Will Not Be Doubtful Further—
President Corroborates
Statements.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Secretary of State Hughes struck back today at attacks on his administration by a letter to Senator Lodge he denied the existence of any secret agreement between the United States and Great Britain as was charged yesterday by Senator Borah.

Hughes also, in stinging language, expressed the hope that "American delegates might be saved from further aspersions on their veracity and honor."

The White House today also officially and vigorously denied the existence of any secret agreements between the United States and any power.

PREMIER WILL SEEK SUPPORT

Lloyd-George's Resignation
Likely If He Is Not
Sent To Genoa.

LONDON, March 21.—According to the announcement of Austen Chamberlain in the house of commons today, Premier Lloyd-George will on April 3 ask the commons whether he shall attend the Genoa conference.

Should the commons vote to send Lloyd-George, it will mean a vote of confidence in his government, refusal to sanction the trip will mean lack of confidence. Refusal to sanction his attendance will probably be followed by the premier's resignation.

MURDERER KILLED BY PRISON GUARD

James Ogle, Claremont Tavern
Bandit, Hurls Rock, And Gets
Shot Through Body In Return.

SALEM, Ore., March 21.—James Ogle, one of the Claremont Tavern bandits who killed two prominent Pendleton stockmen at a roadside near Portland in 1919, was killed at the penitentiary here today when guard John Davison, at whom Ogle hurled a large rock in an attempt to escape, shot the lifer through the heart.

Ogle had been in the "bull pen" for a year, and had sworn to "get somebody" when he was let out.

MAY NEED TROOPS ON ULSTER BORDER

Civil War Situation Daily Becoming
Graver—Boundary Disputes
Thought Cause.

LONDON, March 21.—Should the civil war now being waged along the Ulster border assume a graver turn, troops will be dispatched there to restore order, a high British official admitted today.

The situation there is reported as becoming more serious daily. Armed Ulstermen and Irishmen face each other at many points.

Boundary disputes are believed to be the cause.

DOLLAR FAVORS SHIP SUBSIDY

Many Idle Freighters Would
Be Given Chance, Says
Oriental Shipper.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—The passing of the ship subsidy bill proposed by President Harding will take from the mud flats many of the splendid freighters now warped idly to their moorings, according to Captain Robert Dollar, veteran ship operator, and one of the most powerful factors in Oriental shipping today.

Captain Dollar recently returned from a visit to Washington, where he took part in the conference between President Harding and Chairman Lusk and the members of the \$30,000,000 shipping pool recently formed by Pacific coast shippers.

Captain Dollar, following his visit to Washington, renounced his former opposition to ship subsidy. He now believes that it is the best means at hand of maintaining the American merchant marine.

MINE STRIKE ORDER ISSUED

Half Million Workers Told
To Leave Jobs On
April 1.

NEW YORK, March 21.—An order for both bituminous and anthracite coal miners to suspend work April 1 was sent out by officials of the United Mine workers here today, according to an announcement by Phillip Murray, the organization's vice president.

According to a poll report from miners' headquarters in Indianapolis, miners are voting overwhelmingly for a cessation of work April 1 to force operators into a wage conference. The strike call will affect 500,000 men.

GAME LAW CHARGES NET \$150 IN FINES

PAULSON HEARING TO BE WEDNESDAY

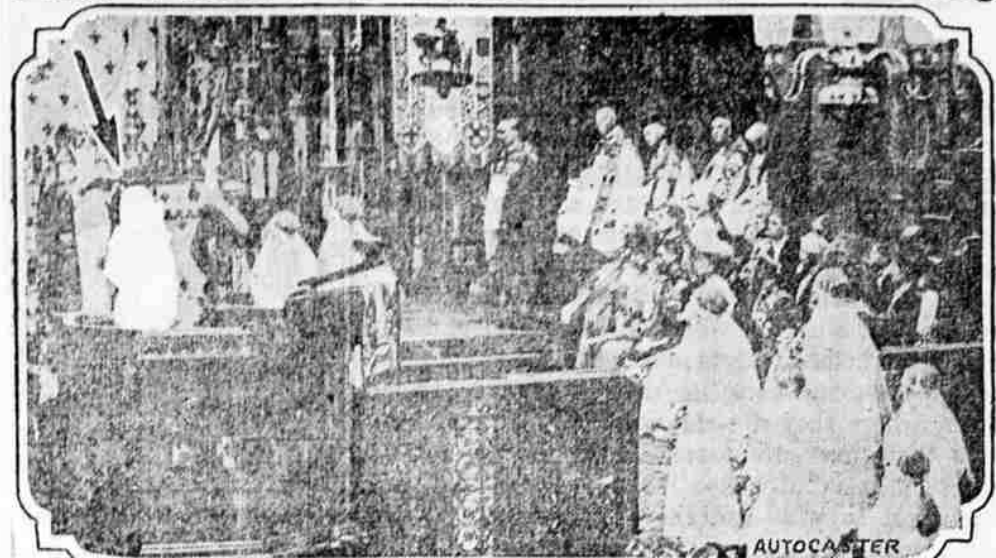

LUMBER SALES MAKING GAINS

Improvement In Industrial
Demand Noted—Production
Less Than Orders

Taking everything into consideration, the lumber market shows betterment. Not only volume of inquiry but total sales have increased, according to the American Lumberman.

In some sections slight confusion has arisen over unannounced decreases in freight rates on southern pine. These reductions apply only to lumber manufactured by mills located east of the Mississippi river, and only to certain territory. At most they will amount to not more than \$1 a thousand feet, so that their influence upon prices will be slight.

Country trade is showing more activity and the belief is that its volume will be greater than was expected six weeks or two months ago.

A steady improvement in industrial demand is also noted. The increase in business is emphasizing that certain grades and workings of softwoods are particularly scarce. For example, No. 3 common southern pine boards are difficult to obtain, as well as No. 2 dimension. Production is increasing but not as fast as the volume of orders. Prices on the whole have not changed particularly, though the market has a stronger tone, so that it is not as easy to obtain concessions as it was two weeks ago.

Covering the period from the first of the year to March 4, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association reports the following "vital" statistics in board feet:

Production, 1,540,450,000; Shipments, 1,469,795,000; Orders, 1,526,784,000.

ECONOMY PLAN IS CRITICIZED

Wilson Commerce Secretary
Says Harding At Wrong
End of Trail.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—President Harding and Budget Director Dawes are on the wrong trail in their hunt for governmental economy, William E. Redfield, secretary of commerce under Woodrow Wilson, believes. Harding and Dawes, "innocently or otherwise" are raising false hopes among the people, he said.

"They are hunting at the wrong end of Pennsylvania avenue," Redfield said. "In the halls of congress is where the solution can be found—not in the departments. I have a great admiration for Mr. Dawes, but he is barking up the wrong tree—the littlest tree. And he is helpless to do otherwise."

SAYS DEMAND PICKS FILMS

Movies Feature Sex Appeal
To Please Cinema
Fans, Stated.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—When the public wants decent motion pictures, it will get them, and not until then.

That is the opinion of Hobart Bosworth, veteran actor and producer. "The public thinks the motion picture industry is rotten," said Bosworth. "Well, the motion picture industry knows the public is rotten."

"It is a disagreeable truth that the reason that so many films are being made with the sex appeal is because the public picks the theaters when such films are shown."

"As long as this is true, the public is going to get that kind of films."

"Personally, I believe that the public is just beginning to adopt a 'thumbs down' attitude on this type of film. It is a good thing."

COURT OVERRULES CLARK DEMURRER

Alleged Improper Joining of De-
fendants In Government Case
Not Recognized By Judge.

PORTLAND, March 21.—Federal Judge Bean yesterday overruled the demurrer of E. L. Clark of La Pine, to the indictment in which Clark is charged with Burton Oney, forest ranger, with presenting a false claim for government payment and for alleged conspiracy to defraud.

Clark alleged in his demurrer that the indictment was an improper joining of the defendants in that he was made to answer in the same indictment for a different crime from that charged against Oney.

Following the opinion United States Attorney Lester W. Humphreys indicated that a new indictment might be asked of the next grand jury to overcome possible errors in the present indictment.

COLLIER TO DEFEND ALLEGED MURDERER

That she has retained John Collier of Portland to defend her husband, charged with second degree murder of Robert H. Krug of Sisters in the spring of 1919, is the statement of Mrs. A. J. Weston, who has been residing in Bend since Weston was returned here for retrial from Salem. Opening of the case is set for April 17.

SUPREME COURT REPELS ATTACK ON DEATH LAW

Appeal of Taylor Slayers
Overruled

CITE BILL OF RIGHTS

Other Convicted Murderers, Including
Abe Evans of Bend, Reprised
Pending Case, Affected
By Ruling.

SALEM, Ore., March 21.—The state supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the Oregon hanging law, in a decision growing out of the case of John Hathlie and Elvie Kirby, convicted murderers of Till Taylor, Umatilla county sheriff, killed over a year ago.

Kirby had appealed to the supreme court after the circuit court of Marion county had denied him a writ of habeas corpus. He attacked the hanging law as a violation of the ancient bill of rights.

Other convicted murderers were granted a reprieve by Governor Olcott until July 7 pending the outcome of the Kirby case. Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, Roseburg murderer with an appeal pending in his own right, was one of these.

One Deschutes county man is affected by the decision—Abe Evans, of Bend under sentence of death for the murder of James Doran in Wasco county last fall.

CLEANUP ORDER GETS RESPONSE

Many Burning Permits Are
Asked To Dispose of
Rubbish In Bend.

That Bend residents are heeding the advice of Fire Chief Tom Carlson, to clean up their yards before the fly season gets under way, is evidenced in the fact that the number of requests for burning permits is increasing daily. Monday, the first day of cleanup week, 20 permits were issued at the fire station, and today indications were that the number was to be doubled.

Burning without permit is strictly prohibited, Carlson emphasized today, and persons who take out permits are being apprised of the rules under which they may burn refuse; no burning near buildings, fires must be watched constantly, and must not burn after dark.

Cleaning of yards, vacant lots and streets is proceeding in satisfactory manner, and at the present rate the city will present a very neat appearance by the end of the week, Carlson stated.

ATTEMPTS LIFE OF CHINESE MINISTER

Student Fires Four Shots, But
Misses—Intended Victim Is
Traitor, He Declares.

PARIS, March 21.—Four shots were fired at Chinese Minister Tchen-gio by a Chinese student today, who, when arrested, declared that the minister was a traitor.

The minister was unhurt, but one of the bullets struck Tsen Goa, a Chinese railway system official.

TELLS REASONS FOR RESIGNING

Formal Statement Given To
Bend School Board By
Superintendent.

Setting forth his reasons for leaving the employ of the Bend school district, City Superintendent S. W. Moore today filed with the school board his written resignation to take effect at the end of the school year. His resignation, informally tendered, had already been favorably acted on by the directors at their last meeting.

In his letter, Superintendent Moore writes:

"Owing to the fact that attempts to embarrass the board of directors, the superintendent, the high school principal and the faculty, have been made by certain defeated candidates for the school board and a few others acting with them, it appeared to me that the high standards at present obtaining in the schools could not longer be maintained. Not desiring to continue in the school under a program of lowered standards and lessened efficiency and also desiring to give the school board the freest hand possible in meeting the crisis incident to a repudiated budget, I felt it would be desirable to withdraw at the end of the present school year, provided the proper adjustment on the unexpired portion of my contract could be made."

"After two months deliberation this matter has been arranged satisfactorily to all concerned, and the additional consideration set at \$600."

"In view of the above facts recited and contingent on the payment of the above mentioned bonus of \$600 cash in hand on even date of this document, I am herewith presenting my resignation to become effective on and after July 1, 1922."
