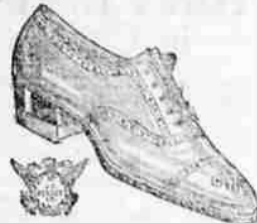

RUSSIA NEEDS MORE HORSES

Livestock Decrease of Over 75 Per Cent Reported By American.

RIGA, March 21.—Russia needs horses as well as grain, according to William Caton, son of Frank Caton, famous trotting horse breeder of Cleveland, Ohio, who has been in Russia continually since 1909.

Ordinary livestock in Siberia, he said, has decreased 75 per cent since the beginning of the war and in European Russia the decrease has been much greater.

Only 4,762 thoroughbred trotters are left in Russia as compared with 250,000 which were owned there before the war," Caton said, "and of 200,000 English thoroughbred horses which were owned in Russia before the war, there are today less than 50."

Referring to horse racing, Caton said: "The sport of kings has not existed in Russia since the beginning of the revolution. Today, however, trotting races have been started again in Moscow, Petrograd and Omsk, but instead of the prewar 5,000 racehorses in Moscow, there are now but 300 and in Petrograd only 50. The races are therefore only poor substitutes for what Russia is accustomed to."
