**B. H. S. Baseball Men are In Good Condition — Lineup for Saturday Announced**

Having braved the elements each evening this week to practice, the Bend high school baseball team is in first class shape to start the season tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, when the Prineville team appears here. Coach Springer has not decided whether Moody or Norcott will start the game on the mound, but it is probable that each will pitch a part of the game. Norcott has improved greatly in control during the past week.

Howell, regular catcher, has improved his throwing to bases since last Sunday's practice game, and stealing second is going to be a hazardous matter tomorrow, says Coach Springer. Howell has been firing the horsehide with a steam behind it that has caused serious swelling to set in on the glove hand of each of the basemen. They grit their teeth every time one of his liners comes their way.

Norcott or McNeely will play first, depending on who pitches; and McNeely or Moody will play shortstop, Springer announced today. Orrell will hold down second base, and Cottingham third.

Captain Blakley will play center field, Philbrook left field and Kohfeld right field, at the opening of the game.

The field will be dragged and sprinkled Saturday morning, and put in first class shape for the game. Good attendance is expected.
