Health Habits for Children.

Health instruction and its result in the formation of habits, is the subject of a daily record of health habits for every child in the schools of Washington, D. C., according to the United States bureau of education, Blanks are marked after the morning daily in-spection by the teacher. Each school day a mark is given for the pupil's observance of such habits as brushing the teeth, carrying a handkerchief, keeping a good posture, taking thirty minutes physical exercise. Thirteen health limbits are noted. At the end of a month a rating is given to cor-respond with the daily record, and the sheet is sent home folded around the report card, to be signed by the parent and returned. It is expected thus to secure the co-operation of the home in inculcating health babits. Children showing extreme neglect are referred to the school nurse.


