FIRE PREVENTION OF CHIEF MOMENT

Debate At Fire Department Meeting Results In Victory For Affirmative.

Fire prevention is more effective than fire fighting, was the decision of the judges following the heated debate held last night at the fire department meeting, the winning team consisting of Chief Tom Carlon, Councilman N. H. Gilbert, and Assistant Chief John Taylor. The great percentage of fires which are preventable was stressed by the affirmative team, as well as the results gained wherever an active campaign for prevention has been carried out. The question was, "Resolved, that fire prevention is more effective than fire fighting." The negative team, composed of Second Assistant Chief Fred Ellenburg, S. Stutsman and Engineer Willard Houston, brought out the fact that many fires are not preventable, notably that which destroyed much of the city of San Francisco, and that prevention does little good unless there is a fire department to fight such fires as do occur in spite of the vigilance efforts.

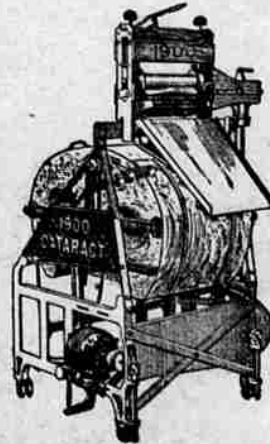
