

GENERAL OBSERVANCE PLANNED FOR TUESDAY, MEMORIAL DAY

Rev. F. H. Beard Named To Give Address—Parade Will Be Feature.

Rev. F. H. Beard will give the Memorial day address at the American Legion building next Tuesday. It was announced today by Ivan McGilvray, vice commander of Percy A. Stevens Post No. 4, who is in charge of the arrangements. Due to the fact that the mills will not close, the service will start at 10 o'clock, so that ex-service men, who will be excused from their work, may attend during the morning.

Except for the mills, however, Memorial day will be observed throughout the city as a holiday, all stores being closed during the day. Contrary to past custom, the stores will not remain open on Monday evening, but will close at 6 o'clock as usual, it was stated today by Frank Inabnit, president of the Merchants' association.

The rush of orders which must be finished this month made it impossible for the mill companies to declare a holiday Tuesday. They have made it possible for ex-service men to attend the services in the morning, and the Shevlin-Hixon band has been released for the day by The Shevlin-Hixon Company.

Memorial day has been, since its observance was taken over by the Legion several years ago, generally observed in Bend, and it is expected that next Tuesday the entire city will unite in doing honor to the veterans of America's wars who have died.

Organizations which will take part in the parade to the cemetery, immediately following the services at the American Legion building, will be the Legion and other World war veterans in uniform, the Spanish-American war veterans, the Shevlin-Hixon band, the Bend volunteer fire department, the Boy Scouts, the G. A. R. and the Ladies' auxiliary to the Legion, cars being provided for the last two organizations named.

- Memorial Day address by Rev. F. H. Beard.
- "The Star Spangled Banner," Shevlin-Hixon band.
- Benediction, Rev. S. A. Stenseth.
- Services at the cemetery, following.

the parade, will include a sacred selection by the band, a short address by Rev. J. L. Webster, decoration of the graves, firing of the salute, and the sounding of taps.

AT THE CAMP GROUND

Considering what other towns in Central Oregon are doing toward providing accommodations for the traveling motorist, it is well that Bend is at last on the direct road to owning and operating a creditable resort.

Redmond will open her new public camp ground on June 1, and is proclaiming to the world that she has one of the finest camp grounds for a town of her size in the state. It is electric lighted, fitted with running water, and has a community house containing range and all necessary furniture. Free wood is also furnished, and it is situated on The Dalles-California and McKenzie highways, two blocks from the center of town. The grounds are to be seeded and planted to flowers and shrubbery. A caretaker will be on the job at all times to give information and look after the comfort of the travelers, according to the Spokesman. A charge is to be made for accommodations.

Burns has a novel camp ground in that shade is provided by a high board fence which entirely surrounds the camp, according to M. L. Williams, who is one of a party from Weed, Cal., now visiting Bend's camp. The Burns camp is arranged in a series of stalls around the inside of the wall. Wood and water are provided, and the Burns people are planning to install a swimming pool.

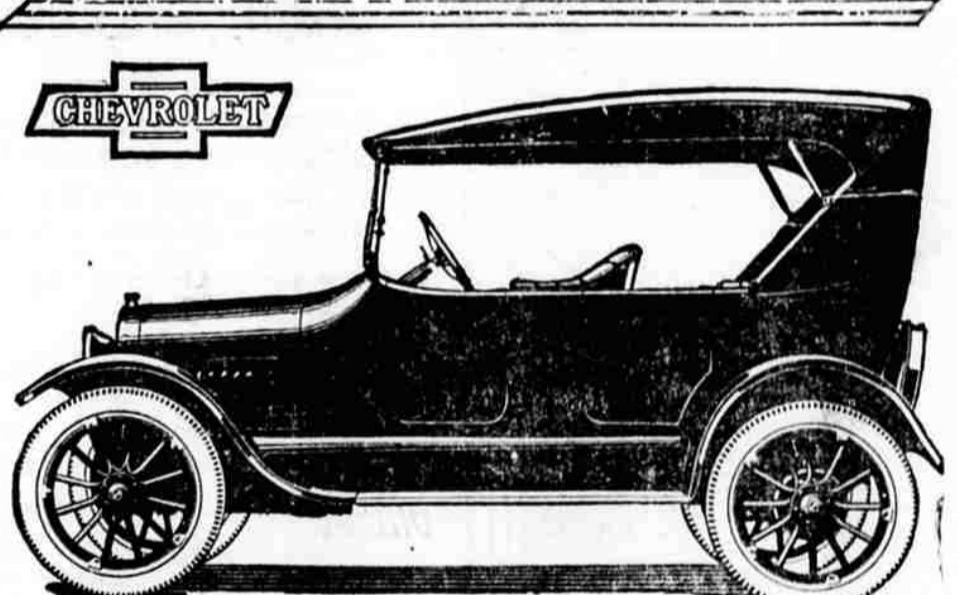
