But the animal could not understand a word of English, and when it was necessary for one of the members of the play to speak to it, her owners told the non-French speaking party how to pronounce the phrase, and presto, Marie, her great eyes beaming with intelligence, jumped and hurried to the response.

The dog was secured in Souge, France, when she was three years old. She is three-quarters Anatian shepherd and one-fourth Wolf. She is owned by a Los Angeles business man.


