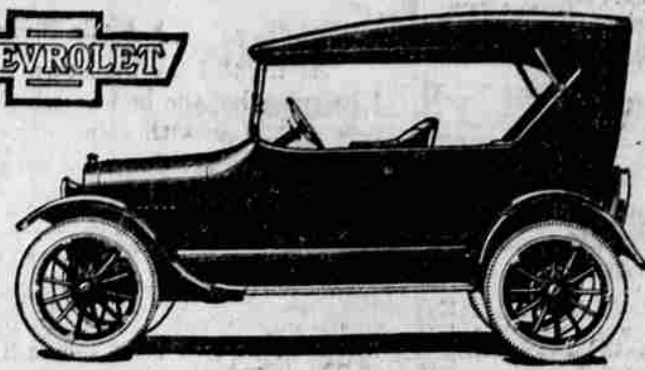
MOVIE COMPANY TO FILM SCENIC VIEWS
