Zevely was formerly agent for the City of Prineville railway at Prineville Junction.

Kregness has asked for three months' leave of absence from his position with the railroad company, so that it would be possible for him to return within that time, but states that he plans to leave the railroad work permanently.

RAIN FIGURES USED IN MAIL ROUTE PLEA

Acting Postmaster, In Application, Seeks To Show Sidewalks Aren't Necessary.

Sidewalks should not be required in Bend in establishing new city carrier mail routes, Postmaster S. C. Seeds will seek to prove to the post-office department through the use of statistics showing that Bend's average annual precipitation is only 11.91 inches. For routes previously designated, sidewalks have been requisite, but in the outlying sections of the city, both residences and sidewalks are somewhat scattered.

Seeds is endeavoring to secure carrier delivery for 2,900 people who must now call at the office for their mail.
