Norval Springer and Joe Storzinger were among those from Bend who hunted deer Sunday.

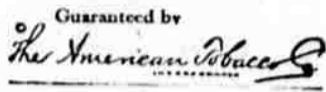
Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Smith of Redmond have gone to Rainier national park to spend a week.
