MARKET RISE MORE GENERAL

Railroad Stocks Show Further Gains

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, May 5.—Stimulated by indications that the market had definitely broken away from its recent depression, operations for the rise spread to fresh groups in today's session. Strong bullish demonstrations went ahead in various sections of the list at all stages of the day, keeping general trading in a buoyant condition.

Further advances occurred in Southern Railway and Frisco common, whose achievements of new highs were the outstanding performances of the day. In the individual group new highs on the current recovery were reported by General Electric, Cast Iron Pipe, Baldwin, American Car & Foundry and Sinclair leaders. Although the upward trend of prices became less pronounced in the afternoon, encountering resistance from professionals believing that a reaction was due, it was fairly well maintained.

APRIL'S RAINFALL MORE THAN USUAL

Precipitation of 1.79 Inches Recorded for the Month

April, 1925, was marked by a total precipitation considerably above the average, 1.79 inches of rain having been recorded for the month. It is shown in the data compiled by the cooperative weather observer in Bend. One-half an inch of snow fell in April.

The April temperature was comparatively equable for a month which in other years has been marked by a great variance of temperature. The average minimum temperature for the month was 33.86 degrees, or more than one degree above the freezing point. The maximum temperature was 79 degrees, on April 9.
