Norwegians to Observe Settlement Date

TWEET IS INVITED

Will Take Relic of Viking Days, Heirloom In Fam- ily, to Minneapolis

Thomas Tweet, Civil war veteran and Bend pioneer, has been named as a member of President Calvin Coolidge's honorary bodyguard in connection with the anniversary of the first Norwegian settlement in America, which will be observed at Minneapolis the first week in June, it was learned today.

Tweet has written to the committee stating that he will be unable to attend, but since writing, he finds that he may be able to go east for the celebration.

The committee in charge is seeking relics of the Vikings, first European visitors to America, and if Tweet goes to the celebration, he will be along one which has been in his family for so many generations that it is impossible to compute the number of years—a carved silver drinking cup carried by the Vikings, Tweet says, when they went to collect taxes from the Britons.

The elders of the Norwegians who are members of the G. A. R. are being chosen for the president's bodyguard when he attends the centennial at Minneapolis, Tweet explains.

The president of the Norwegian national legislative body will be present and also, according to reports, the Norwegian crown prince, Tweet stated. It will be one of the biggest gatherings of people in the United States this year.

Early Bend Resident
Tweet has been a resident of Bend since 1902, and was associated with John Steidl, his son-in-law, in the operation of the Steidl & Tweet sawmill, one of the first mills here. They also were active in developing an early power plant, and in real estate promotion.

Tweet enlisted in the Seventh Wisconsin infantry in June, 1861, immediately after the first battle of Bull Run, and served in that regiment throughout the war. He was in the battles on the Potomac, took part in the skirmishes in the wilderness during 1864, when his regiment fought almost constantly for 15 days, and saw other important service. He still has as a souvenir of the war the sharpshooter's rifle which he carried during the later engagements.

Manual Training Boys Make Stage Settings

Preparation of scenery for the Kenwood school pageant which will be given May 15 is progressing rapidly. Six boys in the manual training department of the school have been working for 10 days on the stage settings, under the supervision of Charles W. Frost.

Gordon Speck, director of the pageant, has designed the scenery in conformity with the newest idea along this line, the "formal stage." Instead of seeking a natural background, the stage is perfectly balanced as to entrances and the decorations are applied in straight lines, using not more than one or two colors.

Six Firemen Victims of Warehouse Flames

Roof, Walls Collapse, Al- lowing Four to Live

Cause of Early Morning Fire in Atlanta Unknown—Heavy Smoke Hampers Fire Department

ATLANTA, Ga., May 6.—Six firemen were killed and four injured in a fire that destroyed a cotton warehouse early today.

The six were trapped inside the burning building and had no chance of escape.

The roof and walls of the warehouse collapsed, snuffing out the lives of the six fire fighters. Four other firemen were extricated from the smoking ruins and taken to a hospital.

The fire started from an unknown cause about 4 a. m. Smoke poured from the building when the firemen arrived.

Four men in command of Captain Bone went to the roof with their hoses and four others led by Lieutenant Dennard went inside the building. The roof and walls caved in almost simultaneously and the six firemen were killed.

Complete Tumalo Line Tonight, Announcement

Completion of the four line metallic circuit connecting the Tumalo community with Bend has been set for this evening, it is announced by Fred H. Wilson, in charge of the construction work which has been under way for about one month.

Although the eight wires will be strung by tonight, if plans are carried out, the Tumalo community will not be "hooked" in with Bend until May 15, making an equal division of the months, explains Wilson.

Much interest is being shown in the new line of the Farmers' National Telephone Co. by residents of the farming community just north and west of Bend. When the line is placed in use, making it possible for Tumalo people to call any place in Bend without having to pay toll, it will be carrying a near capacity load.

Nine men were working in the attempt to complete the new system by this evening.

Crowding the headlines of the cast for honors was Claude Smith, husband of Zoie. Fern De Berthiaume as Aggie Jinks worked nicely with Mrs. Abbott and "Jimmy" in keeping the audience in convulsions of laughter.

Those playing the leading roles in the clever comedy were ably assisted by Mary Bennett as a mother, Stuart Rae as a father, Genevieve Smith as a winsome maid and Fred Gates as the plain clothes man. Since only one scene was used, there were no delays.

And had there been delays in changing scenery, they would not have been noticed. De Berthiaume, director of the show, presented entertainers whose work was equal to that of the actors of the cast. AIR, LAND, SEA ATTACK CLOSES UPON RUM ROW

Starvation or Surrender Alternative

MORE VESSELS SENT

Liquor Carriers All of For- eign Registration, inves- tigation Reveals

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
CLIFTON, N. Y., May 6.—Re-
solved from air, land and sea, rum
row today faced starvation or sur-
render as the dry flotilla and a
squadron of seaplanes wove a web
to cut off the food and water supply
of the liquor laden ships.

While the prohibition navy was
maneuvering into a 50 mile block-
ade, 12 more government ships set
sail for liquor lane, 20 picket boats
began patrolling the Jersey coast
and automobile patrols were assigned
to coast guard stations all along the
Atlantic seaboard.

Reports received here today indi-
cate that rum row now consists of
15 ships, all of foreign registration.
These include eight four masted
British schooners, each capable of
carrying a cargo of 5,000 cases of
liquor. Most of the craft are an-
chored 25 to 40 miles off shore.

The government is conducting the
major offensive on a real war basis.
Sealed orders, messages in wireless
codes, secret expeditions for recon-
naissance—all these figure in the
greatest campaign ever waged
against rum row.

Baby Girl At Tumalo Found Dead In Water

Father Vainly Tries Resus- citative Methods

Little Daughter of Mr. and Mrs.
Roy Shaver May Have Been
Killed By Shock, Theory

Lola, 18 month old daughter of
Mr. and Mrs. Roy Shaver of Pine-
hurst, just west of Tumalo, was
drowned late yesterday evening, at
about 5:45 o'clock, when she fell
into a small irrigation ditch near the
Shaver home.

The little girl toddled out of the
house, where her mother and older
sisters were preparing the evening
meal. When the baby was missed
from the house, one of her sisters
started a search for her.

The body of the baby was found
face down in the ditch, which is only
about three feet wide and a foot and
one-half deep. Just how long she
had been dead is not definitely
known, but since she had been miss-
ing from the house for only a short
time, it is estimated that it could not
have been long.

Shaver, who had been in Bend
on a business trip, arrived at his
home at about the same time the
body was found. Having had con-
siderable experience with drowning
persons, he tried resuscitative meth-
ods, which proved of no avail. A
call for a physician was sent to Bend
when the body was found, and Dr.
J. W. Thom reached the Pinehurst
farm in less than 15 minutes after
receiving the message.

It is the opinion of the attending
physician that death was caused by
the shock of falling into the cold wa-
ter, instead of by suffocation in the
water. Had death not been instan-
taneous, it is believed that the baby
could have struggled out of the small
stream.

Since the little girl obviously came
to her death as the result of falling
into the irrigation ditch, no inquest
will be held. It is announced by
County Coroner C. P. Niswonger
The body will be taken to Madras
for burial. Mr. and Mrs. Shaver
have lived in the Tumalo community
for only a short time.

OPERATORS EVICT MINERS' FAMILIES

New Move Made In West Virginia Industrial War

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., May 6.—
A new phase in the industrial war
between bituminous coal mine op-
erators and miners developed today
when agents of the Rosedale Coal
Company started wholesale eviction
of miners' families from company
houses near Maidsville.

Twenty-three eviction writs were
issued and 12 families had been dis-
possessed by the sheriff today.

The eviction proceedings were in-
stituted some time ago by the Ros-
edale company. After one case had
been tried and decided in favor of
the company, counsel for the miners
waived preliminary hearings and
consented to the same verdict in all
the cases.

The miners then carried the case
to the circuit court of appeals. A
decision of the circuit court favoring
the company was handed down yes-
terday and dispossessing of the min-
ers' families from their homes was
started at once.

Eugene H. Long, counsel for the
United Mine Workers, today ex-
pressed surprise at the eviction ac-
tion, declaring he had been led to
understand there would be a 50 days'
suspension of judgment to permit an
appeal to the state supreme court.

Long said he would take steps to-
day in an effort to stop the evictions.

Ship Commander Freed After Liquor Hearing

NAVAL BASE, Hampton Roads,
Va., May 6.—Commander D. W. Ful-
ler today was acquitted by a court-
martial of neglect of duty in con-
nection with the discovery of 200 gal-
lons of liquor aboard his ship, the
U. S. S. Beaufort, on its arrival from
the West Indies here last February.

The court deliberated less than
two minutes before starting to free
Fuller.

Five officers of the Beaufort, ac-
cused of bringing the liquor aboard
the vessel, now will be tried.

Prisoners Working Roads Fifteen Miles From Bend

County and city prisoners are at
present being worked on the Bend-
Burns road, about 15 miles out of
Bend, it is reported by J. S. Innes,
county commissioner. The prison-
ers, five in number, are smoothing
over rough spots in the road and
making other improvements. They
are supervised by George Purdum.

WIFE WAS AIDE TO W. SHEPHERD, JURY DECLARES

Charge Responsibility of Deaths Shared

AVOIDS CELL IN JAIL

Mercurial Poison and Use of Typhoid Germs Is Al- leged In Complaint

CHICAGO, May 6.—Mrs. Julie
Shepherd, charged with her hus-
band, William D. Shepherd, with the
alleged murder of Billy McClintock,
the "millionaire orphan," and his
mother, Mrs. McClintock, surren-
dered to the state at 3:45 p. m. to-
day.

CHICAGO, May 6.—Charges of
murder in connection with the death
of Mrs. Emma McClintock and her
son, Billy, were prepared today
against Mrs. Julie Shepherd by the
state's attorney's office. The charges
will be placed before the grand jury
in accordance with the findings of a
coroner's jury last night. The jury
returned a verdict charging that Mrs.
Shepherd was an accessory of her
husband in the alleged murder of the
mother and son. William D. Shep-
herd is already awaiting trial on a
charge of murdering Billy, but the
jury also accused him of poisoning
Mrs. McClintock.

The jury held that Mrs. McClin-
tock came to her death by mercurial
poisoning, and that Billy's death was
caused by the inoculation of typhoid
fever germs.

Mrs. Shepherd is expected to sur-
render some time today. Officers
who went to her suburban home fol-
lowing the jury's report found she
had left some time before their ar-
rest.

More Troubles Appear In Women's Convention

Segregation of Colored Sis- ters Objected to

Seemingly By Seven Hundred For
Four Hundred Invitations to
Tea Causes More Grief

WASHINGTON, May 6.—New
troubles cropped up today to em-
barrass the 400 women delegates of
all nations to the International
Women's Council convention here,
even before the first general session
was held.

If feeling was manifest in half a
dozen directions over sanction of a
league of nations resolution, segrega-
tion of negroes, which resulted in
withdrawal of 200 colored singers
from last night's musical program,
failure of certain American hostesses
to obtain expected social recogni-
zation, a charge that "reds" were
undermining the convention and a
dispute over alleged pacifism of
leaders.

The White House was drawn into
the hubbub when a fight started
over invitations issued to a tea to
the delegates there this afternoon.
Some 700 women competed for the
privilege of going, members of the
United States council withdrawing
entirely from all attendance in the
hope of making room for all the
guest delegates.

Money Bulges Pockets Of Streets Wanderer

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BOMB EXPLODES, EIGHT TRAPPED IN SUDDEN FIRE

Many Jump To Safety From Windows

LOSS HALF MILLION

Nitro-glycerine Employed to Wreck Italian Fruit Store In Pittsburg Cause

PITTSBURGH, May 6.—Trapped
in their homes, eight persons were
killed early today in a terrific bomb
explosion that leveled four buildings
in the heart of South Swissvale's
business district.

Firemen shortly before noon recov-
ered two more bodies in the ruins,
bringing the death toll to eight.
More than a score of persons were
injured in the blast and fire which
followed.

Six bodies had been recovered at
10 a. m. from the wreckage, which
was swept by fire after the blast. A
checkup by police of residents of the
building bombed showed two missing
at that time.

Fire followed the blast, which
shook the entire Swissvale district
and shattered windows in dwellings
for blocks around.

The persons killed were trapped
in their beds. A score of others
leaped from windows to safety as the
fire spread.

The explosion occurred in a fruit
store owned by Tony Pusatera. The
store crumpled and two buildings ad-
joining were wrecked.

Gas Feeds Flames

Flames enveloped the three build-
ings immediately after the blast. The
fire was fed with gas from broken
mains. Firemen battled for two hours
before controlling the fire. Damage
from the explosion and fire was esti-
mated at \$500,000 by the fire mar-
shal.

The fruit store crumpled like an
egg shell when the explosion came,
and fire quickly spread to the build-
ings adjoining.

Within a few minutes the entire
block was a roaring inferno. Shrik-
ing women and shouting men hung
out of open windows, pleading for
rescue. Amid the din children could
be heard crying.

Firemen ran up extension ladders
and carried many trapped persons to
safety. Men rushed from the crowd
in the street and caught several chil-
dren who were thrown from second
story windows.

County Fire Marshal Pfarr, after
a preliminary investigation, an-
nounced that a nitroglycerine bomb
had been used to wreck the fruit
store.

Former Governor Loses Move to Hold Up Trial

by defense attorneys to quash the
information on which former Gov-
ernor Jonathan M. Davis is to be tried
next week on charges of having so-
licit a bribe for issuance of a pardon,
was overruled by Judge James
A. McClure here today.

Counsel for Davis argued that the
complaint against Davis was faulty
in that it was not sufficiently spec-
ific in the charges; that it attempted
to charge several crimes in one act
and that it did not set out specific
acts that would constitute the solici-
tation as a bribe.

Davis is scheduled to go on trial
next Monday.
