

NAVAL EXPERTS CONCLUDE SOON

Part of Fleet Will Visit Australia

Plea for Pearl Harbor Enlargement Made—Not Naval Base, Asserted

HONOLULU, May 6.—Minus 11 umpires who are already en route back to the United States the last session of the critique over the defenses of the Hawaiian islands was undecided today.

The conference which has been in progress for the past five days, is expected to come to a formal conclusion about noon.

There will not be any definite statement forthcoming as to which side "won the war" in the recent maneuvers, according to reliable information. The press statement promised after the conference is expected merely to include an outline of the benefits derived from the "attack" on the island.

The maneuvers showed that the army and naval forces are able to cooperate readily in defense, which fact was dwelt on with much satisfaction by the umpires in the dis-

cussions, it was reported. Recommendations upon which future defense plans will be based have also been discussed.

The grand fleet leaves tomorrow at 5 a. m. for Lahina Island, where battle formations, torpedo practice and cruising activities will be engaged in. The fleet will later visit the islands of Hawaii and Kauai after which it will return to Honolulu.

Umpires Return

Here the vessels will separate, part of the fleet steaming on into the west for a friendly visit to Australia and the remainder returning to the United States.

Yesterday's sum of the conference was chiefly devoted to rebuttal testimony of both the "blue" and "black" commanders, who submitted their claims to the umpires.

The umpires who sailed for the United States last night included Colonels F. P. Lahm, W. M. Cruikshank, H. J. Brees, J. K. Partello, Charles Lincoln, W. G. Short, Lieutenant Colonel W. H. Raymond, Majors J. S. Pratt, L. S. Chambers, C. M. Milliken and W. H. Hobson.

A plea for enlargement of the Pearl harbor navy base was voiced at the local rotary club luncheon yesterday by Rear Admiral John D. McDonald.

"Pearl harbor is not a navy base," he said. "When all those ships you see out there are able to enter the harbor, then you will have a base, not before."

Yesterday was pay day for the sailors and 49,000 enlisted men swarmed the downtown curio stores and other shops.

NORWAY SENDS PARTY TO POLE

Amundsen In Command of Expedition

Planes to Start On Last Leg of Trip After Vessels Establish Base

COPENHAGEN, May 6.—Roald Amundsen's ships are expected to depart from Kings bay, Spitzbergen, late this afternoon to find a satisfactory jumping off place for Amundsen's proposed polar airplane flight.

Weather conditions are favorable and everything is in readiness for the sailing of the supply and mother ships.

The vessels will seek to locate a satisfactory landing place somewhere on the edge of the polar ice. The southern boundary of the ice is at present unknown.

When the advance workers have located and formed a base, the two airplanes which are to start on the flight across the top of the world will fly from Kings bay, thereby undergoing a difficult task and proving their suitability for the harder trip across the pole and back. At the new base the planes will be filled with sufficient gasoline and oil to enable them to accomplish the final flight. Amundsen plans to carry a relatively small reserve supply of fuel which possibly will become exhausted in the event he encounters difficult flying conditions.

The date of the actual polar flight is thus far undetermined. It depends largely on the weather.


State Leader Coming To Visit Bend Post
