

Just Getting Old Enough To Fight, Declares Dundee

BARELY LOSES TO YOUNGSTER

Veteran Fools Many Expecting Knockout

NEW YORK, May 6.—"Old fellow, me—why I'm just getting old enough to fight," Johnny Dundee, veteran of more than 600 fights over a career of 16 years, said here today.

The veteran hand of Dundee, former featherweight and junior lightweight champion of the world, had been given the commission of writing last night the final entry in the history of Madison Square Garden. The rafters still held the echoes of the ovation that was given to a losing fighter when the wrecking crew went to work on the last of New York's old fight palaces this morning.

Dundee was beaten in a 12 round fight by Sid Terris, a youth from the townships of the east side, who was in his first pair of knee pants when the venerable Dundee started fighting.

Terris won on points from a one handed old man of the ring, but the moral victory went all to the veteran Dundee, whose wise head and stout heart caused a pile of money to be lost by those who had bet even money that he would be knocked out. Dundee never was in danger of having his career ended with a knockout, but he was not able to catch up with the points scored by a younger and faster man.

Dundee tried to start out with his old speed. He bounced around the ring, swung himself off the ropes and got for it nothing.

Terris made a very bad showing, although he was given the decision. Critics were almost unanimous that he will never get any farther than he is now. He has class and everything that goes to make a fighter, except the heart that has kept Dundee going long beyond his time.

Will Crown Amateurs In the Boxing World

BOSTON, Mass., May 6.—Eight amateur boxing champions of the western hemisphere will be crowned here tonight in the first pan-American boxing tournament ever held.

Twenty-four three round bouts have been arranged under the joint auspices of the American Amateur union, the South American Boxing federation and the Canadian Amateur union. Sixteen of the bouts will result in preliminary election for eight final bouts.

The United States has entered 16 men to meet eight men from South America and eight from Canada.

Officials in charge of the tournament expect to hold another pan-American meet in Buenos Aires next year, in Montreal the following year, attend the Olympics in 1928 and resume the pan-American tournament every two years thereafter.
