Prospective Settlers Interested In Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—Names of 2,470 settlers interested in Oregon's agricultural opportunities were received yesterday by the land settlement department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce from H. Way of Transgressor Tough, Says Prisoner

Paddy Ryan's Facile Pen
Indites Tragedy

Genial Host of Three Weeks Ago
At Roadhouse Is Now Cell
Mate—Road Work Irks

Between confinement in the county jail and enforced labor on the county roads, transgressors of the Volstead act in Deschutes county are finding that the way is indeed hard, just as some writer of the long ago advertised that it was.

Intimation to this effect is found in a communication just received by The Bend Bulletin from Paddy Ryan, an inmate of the jail. It reads in part:

"Some few short weeks ago I listened enraptured to an exceeding knowing wight discoursing on the ease with which many shekels could be garnered from ye Country Yokels via the Road House and moonshine Route."

"And as to risk, Faugh, Sirrah, I am too old a Fox to be caught by the traps set hereabout (Ho, varlet, fill the goblets up, the gent here will pay). Yea verily, even unto nine and twenty times in the short space of one week have I been raided by ye bailiffs. Yet still do I flourish. Each morn does my faithful steward count into my strong room many taels of silver."

"Three weeks have elapsed. 'I sit and ponder on the wisdom of Omar Khayyam who saith 'enjoy thy liberty while yet you may, tomorrow you may be in the Housegaw.' And verily here I am."

"What ho, turnkey. Who is this likely youth who paces the allotted it is none other than Ye Genial Host twelve by six? Burn me for a wretch, of Ye Sign of Ye Olde Road House."

"In the dead of night Ye Scourge Knaves Ye Bailiff Roberis and Ye Bailiff Stokoe did descend on this worthy landlord and by force of arms bear him from behind ye Oak Panelled bar and hale him before Ye Beak, along with a beaker of Ye Good Olde Heady Mende."

"Vainly did Ye Wise Olde Bird rave, Vainly did he quote ye good Olde Constitution. Hoarsely did he quote ye chapters made and provided."

"Much filthly Laerte was he assessed by Ye Beak, and yea, even unto six months on Ye Sturdy Rock Pile."

RIFFIAN ATTACKERS ARE HELD IN CHECK

French Outposts Safe, Says
Official Report

BARAT, May 7.—All danger to French outposts along the Ouegha river, which were attacked and in some instances isolated by Moorish tribesmen of Abd El Keim, has been removed, it was officially announced today.

The Riffian attack has been halted and turned back. Where the French occupy defensive positions, virtually none of the enemy is to be found.

TANGIERS, May 7.—Three French columns in Morocco are pressing hard upon the Riffians.

General Colombat, who commands the left wing of the French line met stubborn resistance from the Moors in his territory, but succeeded in relieving more isolated posts in the western section.

Advancing farther eastward Colonel Cambay met with a heavy attack in the Kifan district.

Colonel Freidenburg, commanding the third column, advanced north from the river Ouegha and is clearing the neighborhood around Tauna.

Race Rioting Is Checked In Arkansas Oil Fields

ELDORADO, Ark., May 7.—Precautions were taken here today to prevent further rioting between white and negro oil field workers, following last night's fight in which one negro was killed and several white men seriously wounded.

The fight began when 200 white workers asked the foreman of a camp of negro workers to have the negroes move out.

Irrigation Season Opens On The Ochoco Project

PRINEVILLE, May 7.—Water is now running in the Ochoco canal and the 1925 irrigation season is on. Before the first water had been drawn from the reservoir, 34,420 acre feet had accumulated, and the gain over the water used is more than 200 acre feet per day.

McKay creek is holding out well and very little, if any, water will be used below the place where McKay crosses the canal.

ORDER OWNERS TO PUT IN MAINS FOR NEW AREAS

General Policy Is Stated
By Commission

PETITION IS DENIED

Water Company Must Buy
System When Revenue
Is Thirty Per Cent

Water mains in new additions in Bend shall be built at the cost of the promoters, according to a general policy laid down by the public service commission of Oregon in ruling on the petition of the property owners in Northwest Townsite Co. second addition and intervening petitions of the Bonne Home company and the First National bank, on which a hearing was held here two weeks ago.

The petition of the residents in Northwest Townsite Co. second addition was denied, the order received here Wednesday evening announced. "For the reason that the prospective revenue to be obtained from petitioners and others in the addition would not justify the construction of the necessary extension of mains at the sole expense of the water utility."

By reason of the petitions of intervention and the testimony offered by the petitioners, the commission is of the opinion, its order states, "that the issues herein should be broadened and that public necessity and convenience demands that rules and regulations be adopted governing the extension of water service."

These rules are essentially as follows:

1. The utility (the Bend Water, Light & Power Co.) will be required to make connection to all mains installed at the sole expense of any agency developing real estate additions, provided that such mains are installed in accordance with the standards for installation of mains used by the utility in its own construction.

2. The agency, at its option, may purchase water at the point of connection at the regular meter rates, or it may comply with rules three, four and five, which provide:

3. Such agency shall execute a contract transferring legal title of mains (subject to equity of agency as set out in rules 4 and 5.) Pending final purchase by the utility, no connection for extensions other than the assigns of the agency may be made to mains installed under the conditions of rule 1, without the written consent of the agency.

4. After the execution of contract specified in rule 2 (which provides that the utility shall be required to purchase an interest in the mains) the utility shall install at its own expense all service connections from mains to property line where houses have been constructed, or where prospective owners will advance the amount of six months estimated bills.

No service installation may be required at utility expense where the agency complies only with rule 1 and exercises option to purchase water.

5. (Provides for a basis of partial payment and for estimating costs, maintenance and depreciation.)

6. At such time as the annual revenue derived from any extension of mains under rule 1 shall equal 20 per cent of the cost of such extension, the utility shall make a final payment which with the partial payments already made will equal the original cost of installation less accrued depreciation. (The remainder of the rule sets forth conditions of this purchase and further rules for computing depreciation.)

7. In order to avoid controversies over the propriety of original cost at which extensions are to be finally purchased by the utility, it is required that installation of mains be done by the utility.

The requirement that revenues equal 30 per cent of the total cost of installation before final purchase by the utility was considered by the commission to be a modest demand on the part of the utility. Manager T. H. Foley stated today, for the reason that but a slight margin exists between this percentage and the percentage of revenue which goes into operating expense, leaving a very slight percentage of profit under the proposed arrangement.

This ruling, Foley explained, sets down a definite policy for all future extensions, although its general provisions have been the basis for past agreements between the utility and real estate promoters, the agreements varying, however, in the past with the location and other conditions.

Wild Animal Chased On Downtown Street

Ferocious Mus Musculus
Frightens Women

Even Dog Keeps Safe Distance—
Animal Hides On Chassis of
Auto, Rides to Safety

Probably it wasn't so thrilling as the fight between the three toed horse and the shinnymhippus in those ancient days when the slope of Mount Multnomah extended as far east as the present site of Bend, but there was staged on the streets of the city shortly before noon today a "wild animal" hunt which attracted an interested crowd.

The animal was, and still is, so far as known, a member of that species which put fair maidens to flight, as did the creature today. It was a mouse. The ferocious mus musculus, as it is catalogued by scientists, was first sighted as it ambled down Franklin avenue, turning the corner sharply on Wall.

His nibs decided to try the middle of the street when several feminine momentarily halted his stroll, so mus musculus crossed Wall to the automobile owned by J. M. Childers, parked in front of the Mannheimer store. By this time a considerable crowd was gathering and the hunt was on, with the majority of the spectators holding thumbs up, apparently favoring the under mouse.

But at this phase of the wild animal chase things looked very dark for mus musculus, for a man with a stern looking dog appeared on the scene. After circling the automobile some half dozen times, the dog spotted the mouse. Apparently the hunt was over. Even one of the women who had been chased by the mouse said, "Don't kill him."

After looking the mouse over from a safe distance, the white dog obviously decided that mus musculus might be a shinnymhippus, or some allied creature, in disguise. Instead of shaking the mouse into eternity, the dog continued the chase from a safe distance.

Mus musculus at this stage of the game demonstrated that he could easily adapt himself to the environment of man. He climbed up the wheel of the automobile, then disappeared under the chassis. Shortly afterward, the machine was driven away, his nibs still a passenger.

SLAYER OF HEALE PLEADS INSANITY

Trial Set for June—Seeks
Temporary Freedom

TACOMA, Wash., May 7.—George A. Conger, customs inspector, was arraigned in superior court today on a charge of murdering his wife's friend, Robert S. Heale, following an argument early Sunday morning at her home.

He entered a plea of not guilty by reason of temporary insanity, and his trial was set for June 29 in Judge Clifford's court.

The first step in his fight for temporary freedom was won by Conger this morning when his attorney obtained a writ of habeas corpus from Presiding Judge W. O. Chapman, which will be argued this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Conger alleges in his affidavit that he is deprived of his freedom illegally in that he has not been admitted to bail. The affidavit asserts that Conger had not premeditated the killing of Heale and that the offense is less than first degree murder and ballable.

Electrical Storm Is Followed By Rainfall

Bend in the past 24 hours has experienced spring, summer and fall weather. Yesterday afternoon the temperature crawled up to the 80 mark, only to dip to a point three degrees above freezing last night.

The summer like temperature of yesterday was climaxed by a thunder storm late in the afternoon. One bolt of lightning flashed so near this town that for a time it was believed that some part of Bend had been hit.

The electrical storm was followed last night by a spring like rain, the precipitation measuring .11 of an inch. This morning a hail storm swept over the city, covering the streets with white.

White Held to Grand Jury On Non Support Complaint

Delbert F. White, arrested several days ago for non support on a charge brought by his wife, Edith L. White, yesterday waived preliminary examination and was bound over to the grand jury which meets in October. He was released on furnishing a \$500 surety bond.

SUPPORT GIVEN FEDERAL BLOCK PLAN FOR BEND

Club Seeks Appropria-
tion for U. S. Building

SOLONS FAVORABLE

Directors Advised to Keep
In Touch With Congress-
men At Next Session

Hopes for a federal building for Bend, to house the local postoffice, the forest service and other government offices, were strengthened today when it was made known that the Oregon congressional delegation has pledged its support to secure an appropriation for such a building. The securing of a federal building for Bend is listed by the Bend Commercial club as one of its major pieces of work for the coming year.

Letters read at today's meeting of the directors of the local commercial club were proof that the congressional delegation has already given the matter consideration. Letters have been received from Congressman N. J. Slinnott and Senators R. N. Stanford and Charles L. McNary. The Oregon legislators advise the Bend Commercial club to keep in touch with them at their next session of congress.

Whether Bend can secure a federal building through an individual appropriation is problematical, but it is known that at the next session of congress the Elliott bill, defeated in the senate at the last session of congress after it had passed the house of representatives, is to come up again. This bill provides an appropriation of \$8,000,000 for the erection of federal buildings in cities where needed.

Urgo National Monument

Another piece of work placed on the club's major program of business for the coming year is the designation of the Three Sisters area as a national monument, as advocated by Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, University of Oregon geologist. A committee of three was named today to work in an attempt to have the federal government designate the Three Sisters area as a national monument. Members of the committee are H. C. Ellis, H. H. De Armond and J. P. Hennessey.

Merchants were urged by the directors of the club at today's meeting to attend meetings of the association more frequently, and to abide by the decision of their secret committee in the matter of solicitation and novelty advertisements.

No star mail route between Bend and Klamath Falls will be designated by the postmaster general at present. It was made known in a communication from Washington, D. C., read at the directors' meeting.

Will Finish Highway Stretch By September

Improving of the 17.3 mile stretch of The Dalles-California highway from Sand Creek north, which is being built by C. Nyberg, will be completed by September 1, Nyberg stated while in Bend today, accompanied by his wife. Nyberg holds a subcontract for this work, under John Hampshire.

The bureau of public roads, Nyberg reports, is preparing to ask bids on the building of eight miles of road adjoining his section on the north, which will reach to within 12 miles of Crescent. Since the contract for last unimproved section this side of Crescent will be let soon, the 12 mile stretch will be the only one unprovided for on this highway.

Nyberg is using a Diesel shovel in the quarry from which he is taking gravel. He reports that the road through his section is in good condition now.

Daughter Identifies Wealthy Mystery Man

Rum Fleet, Dry Navy Both Get Additions

Loophole Through Federal
Blockade Is Sought

Liquor Laden Vessels Sail North-
ward, Government Picket
Boats Take Trail

CLIFTON, N. Y., May 7.—Both sides in the war of attrition between the dry navy and rum row were reinforced today.

Just as the federal fleet expected to see white flags hoisted on the masts of 40 or 50 liquor laden vessels, four more rum runners, including a big German ship from Hamburg, dropped anchor on the seaside of the government's blockade.

At the same time wireless reports received here today were that several liquor laden ships had weighed anchor and were sailing northward, probably with the hope of establishing communication with shore points unguarded by the federal fleet.

Government picket boats are trailing the retreating rum runners, the wireless reports said.

The major portion of rum row still is immobile, however, coast guard officials said.

The program of the association meeting starts at 7 o'clock Friday evening with a devotional by Rev. W. H. Crofts of Prineville. At 7:30 there will be held a brief business session, with C. Nelson Miller, moderator, presiding. The doctrinal sermon will be by Rev. E. R. Johnson of Grass Valley.

At 9:30 Saturday morning the meeting will be resumed, with the devotional by K. A. OREGON TRUNK FILES REQUEST FOR AUTHORITY

Would Build Two New
Lines In Central Oregon

BIG TRAFFIC IS SEEN

Plan to Force Construction
Will Go In Later Ap-
plication, Says

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Application for authority to construct 250 miles of north and south extra road in Oregon was filed with the interstate commerce commission today by the Oregon Trunk railway.

The Oregon Trunk proposes to build two new lines, one from Bend to Klamath Falls, a distance of 170 miles, and the other from Skookum, a junction point on the proposed first line to Klamath Falls by way of Beatty and Bonanza, a distance of 80 miles.

A plan for forcing the proposed construction, the application stated, would be set forth in another application to the commission.

"The territory to be served by the new lines," the application said, "contains a large body of merchantable timber, principally pine, estimated at approximately 4,000,000,000 feet, and moreover, embraces considerable area of farming lands."

"Large mills for cutting such timber will be built if served by more than one railroad, particularly if served by the applicant's railroad with its affiliated and connecting lines. The proposed extensions are now warranted."

LEGION HOSPITAL SUPPORT IS ASKED

State Adjutant Visits Bend
In Interest of Plan

There are at least 200 maimed children in Oregon at present who could be given hospitalization in the Dornbacher hospital in Portland where that building completed and equipped, according to Carl Moser department adjutant of the American Legion in Oregon, here today in the interest of the joint campaign to raise \$60,000 for the maintenance of the proposed hospital for two years and \$50,000 for the national endowment plan of the American Legion.

When Governor Pierce vetoed the appropriation for the maintenance of the children's hospital, the American Legion of Oregon took upon itself the task of securing the necessary funds for the proposed hospital, for which a gift of \$200,000 had been made with the provision that this gift be matched with sufficient funds to maintain the hospital for two years. It is explained by Moser. This hospital in no way conflicts with the Shrine hospital, it is further explained.

Regarding the national endowment fund of the legion, Moser reports that three states have already over subscribed their quotas. These states are Kentucky, Tennessee and Arkansas. The quota of each state is set on a basis of population. Washington is to raise \$75,000 and California about \$250,000. The national campaign is to be completed by July 1.

Moser tonight will attend the regular meeting of the local post of the American Legion, to be attended by delegations from Prineville and Redmond. He will meet with officers of the local post at dinner this evening.

Famous Violinist Marries Without Announcing Hour
