

Holland Seeking Funds To Retain 1928 Olympic Games

SUBSCRIPTIONS BEING SOUGHT

America Doesn't Want Games Until 1933

NEW YORK, May 7.—Members of the International Olympic committee, which meets June 29 at Prague, will select a city to stage the 1928 Olympic games if Holland defaults, F. W. Ruben, secretary of the American Olympic committee, said today.

There is very little doubt, however, that the Amsterdam committee will be able to raise the funds to promote the games without the help of the government, he said.

American members of the International committee will not place the name of an American city as a candidate if Amsterdam should abandon the games, it was understood. Los Angeles has the 1932 games, Ruben said. It will be impossible for Los Angeles to stage the 1928 games, and the American members of the International committee will not ask that two successive games be staged in the United States.

SEEK SUBSCRIPTIONS
AMSTERDAM, May 7.—Town councillors, hoping to retain Amsterdam as the Olympic city in 1928, read an appeal today from the mayor to the public to organize a subscription fund to raise the money to promote the games.

PARIS, May 7.—Baron Coubertin, president of the International Olympic committee, informed the United Press today of his belief that Amsterdam will raise the necessary credits to support the 1928 Olympic games.

The affair is a concern of the Amsterdam municipality rather than of Holland, Baron Coubertin alleged. "However," he added, "should Amsterdam refuse to support the games this would not mean that Los Angeles would automatically obtain them in 1928 rather than in 1933."

THE HAGUE, May 7.—Funds to promote the 1928 Olympic games in Amsterdam will be raised by popular subscription or by a lottery, officials of the Holland Olympic committee said after the second chamber of the Dutch parliament had voted down the government's bill providing a subsidy of 1,000,000 florins to promote the games.

There was a spirited debate in the chamber in which the Calvinists, who attacked the games as heathenish and against the observance of the Lord's day, succeeded in getting a vote of 48 to 36 against it.

Athletes Forced to Retire When Legs Give Out

Johnny Dundee and Deacon Scott Latest Examples of Truth of Old Adage In World of Sport

NEW YORK, May 7.—Almost at the same time the iron man of the ring and the iron man of baseball pulled up at the end of their careers giving proof to the old yarn that "an athlete lasts only as long as his legs."

Johnny Dundee had so much difficulty in keeping his legs moving against Sid Terris Tuesday night that he must retire from the ring or become a sad second rater.

Old Deacon Scott, the Dundee of baseball, who had not missed a ball game since June 29, 1916, had his record of 1,367 consecutive games broken yesterday. He will have to retire from baseball or be content with a substitute seat on the bench of the New York Yankees.

Neither Dundee nor Scott were bitter. They depended upon the skill of their hands and the speed of their legs. With their legs gone, they are no longer first raters.

Scotty, who takes pride in a record that he had never missed a day in school, was heartbroken when Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees, said, "Scotty, guess you'd better let Wanninger go in there today." Wanninger is a 29 year old shortstop just up from the Augusta club of the South Atlantic league.

Like Dundee, who was beaten by the 21 year old Terris just a short time out of the amateur class, Scotty saw youth step in and convince him that he is too old.

Dundee is only 31, and Scotty is 32 but the wear and tear of years in a hard racket had aged them far beyond their years.

Huggins told reporters that Scotty had been replaced because he was not feeling well and was going home for a rest instead of making a trip to St. Louis with the club.

"I'm as well as I ever was," Scotty said. "I don't see why I was benched. I got two hits the day before and I was just beginning to get going. I won't be a sub on any club. I'll quit baseball if I'm no longer any good."

It is quite certain that Scotty has lost his job as a regular with the Yankees and there are no other clubs in the major leagues who want an old man at shortstop.
