

END LONG HIKE FROM ATLANTIC

Long Island Couple Have Enjoyable Trip

Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Benson May Locate in Bend— Walked Across Desert

Beds in the warm sands of the Mojave desert, under the dancing stars of late winter and early spring, are quite satisfying and restful after a hard day's hike, even though these beds have no mattresses, no quilts, no blankets.

Such is the information obtained from Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Benson, transcontinental hikers, in Bend from Long Island, New York. They have traveled some 4,000 miles since the first part of February of the present year.

Just why Mr. and Mrs. Benson, a couple youthful in years, left the Atlantic seaboard of the continent to roam can probably be best explained by the sociologist who uses such term as the "nomadic instinct," "restlessness" or "adventure." The Bensons say they headed westward "just for the sport of it."

One surprising thing about the American continent is its extent in miles. It was found by the hikers not long after they took to the highways west of Philadelphia, where they rode from New York. And another surprising and disconcerting fact learned on the overland journey is that rides are hard to get in isolated parts of the country, except in the far west.

For instance, Mr. and Mrs. Benson would have appreciated a ride over the Mojave desert very much, but since few autoists frequent that part of the country, they were forced to walk most of the way, sleeping, as has been mentioned, on the sand. They carry no bed and scarcely any baggage. When the clothes they wear get soiled, they stop and wash.

Mr. and Mrs. Benson, who arrived in Bend this week from Burns, first touched the Pacific ocean in California. Because they did not care much for Los Angeles, they started northward, through the desert country of Eastern California. After a long hike, they were picked up by James Fellows of Burns and brought to Oregon.

From Burns, the hikers headed toward Bend, and after walking about 40 miles were given a lift to this city from the Gap ranch by A. R. Whitely, Portland accountant. Today they planned to leave for the head of the Metolius, by foot, to look over the scenic country about which they have heard so much.

Mr. and Mrs. Benson, who plan to remain in Bend for a time—probably to make their home here—have kept a log of their journey across the continent, but state that they do not plan to write a book. Yesterday evening they visited the local library and borrowed Mark Twain's "Roughing It."

Referring to "Roughing It," Benson mentions that Twain described Mono lake, east of Sacramento, very appropriately. He says that at Mono lake there is a sign, "The lake that made Mark Twain famous."

The west is great and the hospitality of the people in this part of the world, and especially in South-eastern and Central Oregon cannot be equalled in any part of the country, says Benson.
