RAILROAD BENEFITS

With the extension of the Oregon Trunk to the south in sight it is a proper time to give some thought to just what this new railroad will mean for Bend...

In the first place, of course, the railroad building is bound to stimulate local business during the construction period...

When the road is in operation an immediate effect will be the end of the freighting and supply business now going out of Bend to La Pine and points in Klamath and Lake counties...

If the line is built through to Klamath Falls, it may reasonably be expected that Bend will become a division point and the home of a considerable number of railroad employees...

The new southern outlet for agricultural products will be a great advantage and should stimulate farming in Central Oregon. Vice versa we ought to get southern products here at less cost than is now the case...
