RAILROAD MERGER PLANNED BY FORCE

Gigantic Plan of Aged Magnate Startles

 NEW YORK, May 8.—Leonor Fresnel Loree, who carried a dinner pail in the early days of a spectacular career has startled the railroad world by proposing a giant merger to create a broad transportation system with his Delaware & Hudson railroad as the basis.

Instead of seeking the solace of retirement, Loree, at 67, has begun work on the rail amalgamation project that has amazed even the most far sighted industrial chiefs.

Already the Delaware & Hudson is reported to have an option on the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh. Besides this, Loree, famous as a builder of railroads, would bring the Lehigh and New England, Lehigh and Hudson River, Central Railroad of New Jersey, Lehigh Valley Lackawanna, Wash and several smaller roads under central control.

Starting as a surveyor's apprentice, Loree has risen to fame and fortune—but he had to fight every inch of the way. Leaving Rutgers college while still in his teens, he forsook the life of leisure which was open for him, donned overalls and became a "rod carrier" on the Pennsylvania railroad. Two young men became his particular friends. They were Samuel Rea and Julius Krutchnitt. By an extraordinary coincidence all three of these youthful railroad enthusiasts later climbed to the heights of success in that field.

Rea plans to retire next fall as president of the Pennsylvania railroad and Krutchnitt will retire May 31 as chairman of the board of directors of the Southern Pacific. But Loree continues as head of the Delaware & Hudson and works on his mammoth consolidation scheme.
