

Nurmi And Ritola Face Suspension From A. A. U. Meets

CLAIM EXPENSE BILL EXCESSIVE

Reports Not Correct, Is Officials' Charge

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.) PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 9.—Paavo Nurmi, Finnish running star, and his countryman, Willie Ritola, and three other members of the Finnish American Athletic club have been summoned to appear before the registration committee of the A. A. U. here on Monday and show cause why they should not be barred from the tracks.

The two stars, together with Ilmar Frim, Gunnar Nelson and Guno Fager were suspended last night for alleged acceptance of excessive expenses connected with participation in the College of Osteopathy meet here February 16.

In that meet Nurmi set a new world record for an indoor track, covering the mile and three quarters in 8 minutes 17 2/5 seconds.

The registration board clapped the ban down unknown to Dr. Francois D'Eliseo, acting president of the middle states A. A. U. He expressed surprise at the action of the committee.

"My expense report of the College of Osteopathy meet was received by the national body and OKed," he said. "I am surprised the committee should see fit at this time to put the matter to the front."

James Saylor, secretary of the committee, declared today the suspensions were the outcome of information received subsequent to February 22, the day the expense reports were filed.

"The first reports we received, we found, were incomplete and not correct," he said.

The ban here was clamped on just as word was received that the A. A. U. in New York had lifted Nurmi's suspension and given him permission to race at Fitchburg, Mass., today, and at Worcester, Mass., Monday.

BEAT REDMOND IN SLOW GAME

Bend High Blanks Visitors 8 to 0

By pounding out four runs in the first inning and adding four more in the fifth frame, Bend high school won an easy victory over Redmond in a rather listless game played Friday afternoon on the O'Donnell diamond. A December chill, with the diamond swept by a northwest breeze, affected players and the few spectators alike.

Mahoney, first man at bat for Bend, started the fireworks by swinging the second ball dished up to him by Hein for a hit. He was brought home by Barber, who tripled. Marquardt was out on a fly, but Brink continued the good work by getting a hit, bringing Barber home. Ballantyne struck out. Pitman got to first on an error by Van Wert, and Loomis followed with a hit. When the dust cleared, the score was 4 to 0.

The performance of the first inning was virtually duplicated in the fifth, with Mahoney again the first man up. He got on when Burdick fumbled an easy grounder. Barber followed with a hit. Marquardt was out at first. In the meantime Mahoney scored and Barber followed his dust to the home plate with an error on Shumaker. Brink got to first on a walk, and Ballantyne made first on a fielder's choice. Pitman came through with a hit. The scoring ended with Bend well in the lead, 8 to 0.

In the third and fourth innings, Redmond settled down to business and retired the Bend batters in a one-two-three order. Bend made no runs or hits in the second, third, fourth and sixth cantos. Redmond got nearly as many hits as the Bend players, but Loomis managed to keep them well scattered. The local slingers landed on Hein at times when his nibs ran.

Because several of the Redmond players only recently got off the sick list, and because of the chill of the afternoon, only seven innings were played. The box score follows:

RELAY 100 YARDS RECORD IS BROKEN
 U. of W. Carnival Under Way, Track Fast

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.) SEATTLE, May 9.—Under almost perfect conditions the sixth annual Washington university relay carnival started at the stadium this afternoon. The track was fast. A light wind was blowing but not enough to affect the runners.

In the 100 yard dash, class A, Sweet of Montana made a new record for the relay, covering the distance in 9.9 seconds. Clark of Washington and Schroeder also of Washington were second and third respectively. The former record was made in 1922 by Vic Hurley. It was 10.2 seconds.

In the first 100 yard dash of the day, class C, outside high schools, Darrow, Sumner high, won with a new mark of 16.3 seconds; Moore, Snohomish, second; Carlson, Monroe, third.

In the class B 100 yard dash, Anderson of Washington Freshmen, tied the record of 10.2 seconds. Dailes of Intermountain college was second and Wolf, Pacific university, third.
