THE WATER DOG

If you have any degree of curiosity and give it play you will learn lots of things. They will not always be things of importance. Sometimes in your search for that which will satisfy your curiosity you will get your fingers burned. Sometimes you will uncover a fact that seems to have no value whatever and then on some later day you will be made happy by being able to use your knowledge.

All of which is preliminary (although perhaps unnecessary) to saying that our curiosity was awakened by hearing of Water Dog Lake, that small body of water over beyond Suttle where the boy scouts are to camp this summer. Why the name, we wondered and then we remembered having read years ago of the pleasure some scientist had in discovering water dogs in a Cascade lake. Then we went off to the dictionary and the encyclopedia and the nature book and learned several things.

According to the Century dictionary the water dog is "a large aquatic salamander with gill slits and four short legs." The salamander grows to be a foot long in the Ohio valley and in Japan there is a giant salamander that reaches three feet in length. The water dog of the Oregon lakes is not of the Ohio size, however, though he is, as we understand it, a good bit larger than the lizard we see running about in the hot sun of summer. The Oregon fellow, we are told, is pink beneath and seemingly covered with a sort of mottled that is almost but not quite a slime.

There is a picture of him in the Century and other names are given including "hell bender, mud devil, water puppy, ground puppy and tweek." Another picture in a natural history shows, by the way, a dewt (akin to the water dog) "stalking plant life." That, it seems to us, must be about the acme of excitement.

We suppose that now we shall have a lot of instruction on the water dog from some of our out-of-door brethren of the valley whose opportunities for studying his habits and appearance have not been limited like ours to the pages of the Century dictionary. Let it come, we say, and we shall pass it on. And in the meantime we venture the expression of a slight regret that an old time, sort of indigenous name, one suggesting a lot of local color and an unusual thing (at least to some of us) be changed to suit the uses of even so worthy while an organization as the boy scouts.

The Central Oregon Country

FULLY AS INTERESTING AS THE IRRIGATION DEVELOPMENT IN CENTRAL OREGON THAT HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED, IS THE HISTORY OF THE PART OF IT THAT HAS NOT BEEN ACCOMPLISHED. THIS IS THE HISTORY OF THE DESCHUTES PROJECT, FOR WHICH FEDERAL APPROPRIATION IS NOW BEING SOUGHT WITH CONSIDERABLE HOPE OF SUCCESS.

THE DESCHUTES PROJECT BECAME A CONCRETE ACTUALITY—ON PAPER—in 1914 ON THE ISSUANCE OF THE DESCHUTES PROJECT REPORT BY THE COOPERATING OFFICERS OF THE STATE AND OF THE RECLAMATION SERVICE. THE REPORT WAS COMPILED BY JOHN T. WHISTLER.

THE FEDERAL LAW HAD PROVIDED FOR SUCH COOPERATION IN 1902, BUT THE STATE DID NOT PASS A LAW AGREEING TO THE PLAN UNTIL 1913. IN THE SAME YEAR JOHN H. LEWIS, STATE ENGINEER, AND E. G. HOPSON, SUPERVISING ENGINEER FOR THE RECLAMATION SERVICE, ALSO SIGNED AN AGREEMENT TO CONCENTRATE ATTENTION ON THE LARGE RESERVOIR PROPOSED FOR CONSTRUCTION ON THE DESCHUTES (BENHAM FALLS). THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY HAD MADE A WATER POWER REPORT THE YEAR PREVIOUS, AND A GENERAL SURVEY OF GEOLOGY IN THIS PART OF THE STATE HAD BEEN MADE BY ISRAEL C. RUSSELL OF THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY IN 1908.

WHISTLER'S REPORT WHICH FILLS A CONSIDERABLE VOLUME, LISTS UNIRRIGATED DISTRICTS IN CENTRAL OREGON WHICH SHOULD BE CONSIDERED PARTS OF THE DESCHUTES PROJECT AS FOLLOWS:

WEST SIDE UNIT OF 20,000 ACRES OF STATE TUMALO PROJECT WITH ALTERNATIVE AREA OF 10,000 ACRES; NORTH UNIT OF 100,000 ACRES EAST OF DESCHUTES AND NORTH OF CROOKED RIVER; SOUTH UNIT OF 20,000 ACRES SOUTH OF THE CENTRAL OREGON CANAL AND EXTENDING NORTH TO POWELL BUTTES; AND AN EAST SIDE UNIT OF 20,000 ACRES, CONSISTING OF THE NORTH CANAL UNIT OF THE CENTRAL OREGON IRRIGATION COMPANY.

THE REPORT FOUND ALL OF THESE UNITS DESIRABLE, UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS, EXCEPT THE SOUTH UNIT, WHICH WOULD LATER BECOME A DESIRABLE PROJECT.

IT RECOMMENDED THAT ALL PUBLIC WATER OF THE RIVER ABOVE AUBURN FALLS BE WITHDRAWN FROM SUCH APPROPRIATION AS WOULD INTERFERE WITH THE DESCHUTES PROJECT, AND THE STATE AT THAT TIME CARRIED OUT THIS RECOMMENDATION.

YOUR HEALTH

RAISING HEALTHY CHILDREN

The children of the state of Oregon, over 200,000 strong, who represent our state's future, need wise care and early training. The physical impairment of the coming generation depends entirely on the measures we adopt for prevention and correction. Although Oregon leads the United States with a low infant mortality there is still an appalling amount of unnecessary sickness and disability. Altogether too many children die from preventable diseases and many others go through their childhood weak and sickly when by proper attention they might be strong and healthy.

There are, in round numbers, in the state of Oregon, over 1000 children who are mentally defective, and over 1000 who are handicapped with organic heart disease. Over 4000 children have defective vision; over 3000 have defects of hearing; over 15,000 have adenoids or dis-

eased tonsils; and over 50,000 have defective teeth. During the past year there were 15,674 births in this state. One in 20 of these children will probably die during the first year of life. One hundred and fifty are mentally defective; over 100 of them have organic heart disease; 600 have defective vision; 450 defective hearing; one-quarter of them have adenoids and diseased tonsils, and over one-half of them will develop defective teeth. By the time they reach adult life only one-third of them will be "classed among the physically fit."

In a state as rich and intelligent as the state of Oregon we should have few children developing into manhood and womanhood with handicaps or remedial physical defects. The practical problem of bringing up healthy children demands that each child must be carefully considered and all remedial defects removed. It is wasted time and money trying to force defective children through the regular mill of school work. Every child should have a physical examination before his entrance to school, put in the best possible condition, and maintained in that condition by careful supervision. We are responsible for the normal development of our children. Children are born without habits, but habits are soon formed and the bad ones come more easily than the good ones.

In order to grow healthy children a comprehensive and intelligent program must be adopted. Provisions must be made to insure:

1. That every child is well born.
2. That every mother receives proper attention and care.
3. That every child is protected from improper care and that physical defects are corrected before serious harm is done.
4. That frequent physical examinations are made to insure normal development.

May Day is Child Health day. Celebrate it by giving every child in this state a chance for health and happiness.
