WILL SEEK LANDING
ALONG CHESAPEAKERum Row to Attempt Only
Remaining Way Out

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Rum row, blockaded from its New York and New Jersey landings, will disperse and the rum ships will try their last chance—landing of liquor along Chesapeake bay and other points near centers of population, according to information here today.

Coast guard headquarters, from which Rear Admiral F. C. Billard is directing the blockade of 2,000 square miles of New York and New Jersey, is preparing to such as many vessels as possible to these other inlets within a week, it was learned.

Boats armed with machine guns and one pounders on the great lakes, are attempting to cope with a separate aspect of the same problem. No protest has been made by the Canadian government, although unofficial observers have claimed this armament violates Canadian-American boundary treaties.

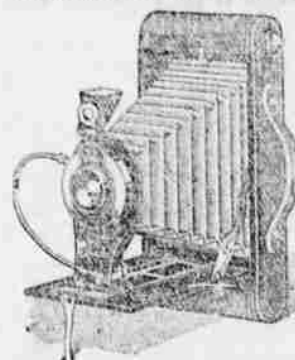
