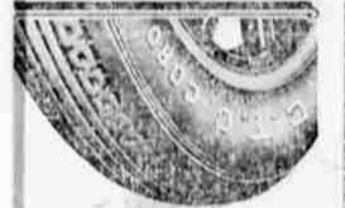

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COOPER IS WINNER By STEADY DRIVING

Takes Memorial Day Race. \$10,000 Prize

 CHARLOTTE SPEEDWAY, Charlotte, N. C., May 11.—Maintaining his lead by steady, consistent driving, Earl Cooper today won the 250 mile memorial day race, winning the first prize of \$10,000.

Harry Hartz was second and Tommy Milton, winner of last year's race, who led today's field for the first 200 miles, came in third.

Cooper's official time was two hours two minutes and 55 seconds, an average of nearly 125 miles an hour.

Tommy Milton was leading at the end of the first 50 miles after a thrilling fight for first place. De Paolo was forced to the pits on the 17th lap due to tire trouble.

At 100 miles Milton still held the lead, with Cooper and Duray following in order. Jerry Wunderlich was forced from the race on his 16th lap with a broken axle. W. E. Shattuck also broke an axle and was forced out on his 11st lap.

Reg Johnson's machine turned three somersaults on his 94th lap on one of the turns. He was thrown for a considerable distance and was taken to the field hospital.

It was learned later that Johnson was not hurt, except for bruises.

Milton was still leading at the 150 mile mark with Cooper trailing him. Harry Hartz went into third place when Duray was forced out on account of engine trouble. Hill and Elliott were also out with engine trouble.

Cooper was leading at 200 miles, taking first place on the 154th lap when Milton's engine began to miss. Harry Hartz climbed into second place and Milton third.
