Rural School Boards To Make Own Budgets

Budgets for school districts of the third class will be made out this year by the board of directors and not by a budget committee, it is explained by J. Alton Thompson, county superintendent of schools. This new ruling is in accordance with a measure approved at the last session of the state legislature.

Instead of making out three accounting sheets and notices as in past years, officers of the various districts this year have only to make out one budget notice, this to be posted on the door of the school house, explains Thompson, who approves the new method.

All but two school districts in Deschutes county, not including the union high school districts, are affected by the new ruling relative to the making out of the annual budgets. Budgets made out by the school boards are to be posted not later than May 23. The annual meeting of districts of the third class will be held on June 15.

More Evidence Points To Boy In Death Case

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 11.—Testimony that Teddy Dillon, 19, was in St. Louis the day his father, Dr. William A. Dillon, was murdered, will be presented at a coroner's inquest tomorrow.

George A. Barth, a news dealer, said he had known young Dillon for five years and saw him on April 20. Dr. Dillon was slain that night. Barth said he talked with the boy for several minutes.

So far, despite hours of imprisonment,

ment, the youth has refused to tell his whereabouts the night of the murder. He was not at Lawrence, Kansas, where he was living, it has been learned.

Dillon was released from the police station at Clayton shortly before noon after being held for more than 60 hours.

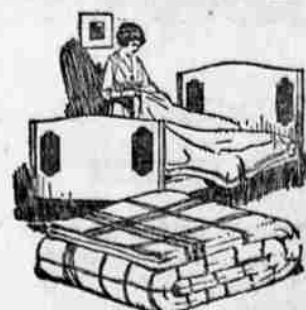
