TRADE OUTLOOK
BEARING NOTEDRubber and Tire Stocks
Reach High Levels

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, May 11.—Today's market evinced an increasing disposition to discriminate in favor of the stocks enjoying favorable trade conditions. Attention was directed to the rubber and tire stocks by another five cent jump in crude rubber, carrying the price to the highest level attained since 1920, at 61 cents.

This rise was followed by activity at advancing prices in United States Rubber, Goodrich, Goodyear preferred and other representative issues of this class. Motors were also in urgent demand. Studebaker went to a new high for the year. Willys-Overland preferred also made a new high, while the common stock of the latter sold at levels representing an appreciation of close to three times the year's low.

Rails which led last week's vigorous demonstration on the up side were subject to considerable profit taking. Steel common had to absorb heavy selling, but it did so with no particular recession. The market closed irregular.

CHICAGO, May 11.—Grain futures underwent a complete reversal of opening form and closed lower, values being pressed down by late liquidation.

Wheat advanced steadily up to midday on reports of export sales and unfavorable crop advices.

Liverpool finished lower. Export sales were confined to a few scattered lots.

Heavy profit taking caused losses for the day in corn. The close, however, was fractionally above Saturday. On the top large holders sought to reduce lines. Cash eased up. Oats held within a narrow trading range and closed higher. Provisions weakened with grains.

A steadier tone prevails in the foreign markets, following the withdrawal from sales of large quantities in London and Australia. Locally fine and fine medium wools are selling on the basis of \$1.10 to \$1.15 clean. Australian 64-70s combing sold at \$1.10 clean basis in bond, the price being about 3c a pound up from the lows recently made. Nolls are also fairly steady on the basis of \$1.05 for fine lots. Carpet wools are in good demand.
