

# Rumors Of Shakeup On Yankee Team Are Strengthened

## CLUB MANAGER HEADING WEST

### Important Deals Under Way Is Believed

 NEW YORK, May 12.—Rumors circulated for some time that a big shakeup on the New York Yankee ball club is impending were strengthened today when it was learned that Ed Barrow, business manager of the club and former field manager of the Boston Red Sox, was on the way to Chicago to join the team. There is nothing to indicate, however, that the job of Miller Huggins, manager of the team that has run up a winning streak of two games this season, is in peril.

To the contrary, an official of the club said today, "Huggins can have that job as long as he wants it."

Barrow, when he was handling the Red Sox, was known as an iron leader and a disciplinarian of the McGraw school, but he is not expected to use any heavy hand with the club. It is thought that the club has some deal in the making in the west and that he has taken the checkbook of Colonel Jake Ruppert to use the influence of cash.

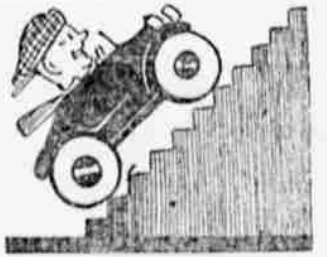
The most interesting question in baseball today is "What has happened to the Yankees?"

#### MUST NOT PRAISE DRY LAW, ORDERED

Mellon Issues Strict Rules For Prohi Posters

 WASHINGTON, May 12.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews has banned all praise of prohibition in the \$50,000 poster campaign the federal dry bureau will spring on the country after July 1. Andrews has limited the slogans to be borne on the posters strictly to phrases urging and extolling respect for all law and the constitution, making the campaign one of general "law observance" and not simply "prohibition observance."

#### Charge Poincare Made Offer to Abd El Krim

 PARIS, May 11.—Raymond Poincare, when minister of foreign affairs in 1923, summoned Abd El Krim to Paris and proposed to support the Riff chieftain in ousting the Spaniards from Morocco, Andre Berthon, communist deputy, charged in the newspaper L'Humanite today. Berthon published in the communist organ an interview he claims to have had with Abd El Krim at the time, when the latter came secretly to Paris two years ago. He alleges Poincare's proposal was to help drive out the Spaniards and to establish a French protectorate in the Riff country in northern Africa. Abd El Krim refused to accept Poincare's proposition, says Berthon, whereupon the then foreign minister ordered Marshal Lyautey to prepare for military action. The communist deputy adds that a few months ago Abd El Krim asked Marshal Lyautey to confer regarding the northern border of French Morocco. Lyautey did not reply, Berthon says, for this would have removed the pretext for the present intervention.

**GANNING WITH ARRELL**

 NEW YORK, May 12.—One of the interesting suggestions made to the American Olympic committee in the reports submitted by sub-committees of managers and coaches who went to Paris last summer was that in the future no wives of managers, coaches and athletes be permitted to take the trip. Inasmuch as several of the managers and coaches made the recommendation and that it did not come from the general committee, it is to be expected that a complaint will come from the feminine quarter that the husbands do not want to take them along, so they can have a good time in foreign countries. The wife question has become a great issue in athletics. Yale university will not permit a student to marry while he is an undergraduate. "Century" Miltstead, one of Yale's greatest tackles, was asked to continue his studies elsewhere when it became known that he had taken unto himself a wife and the feminine societies protested — "Isn't that narrow minded?" Professional baseball faced the issue when several major league club owners announced that their players could not take their wives with them when they were on the road. Many reasons were given and others suggested for refusing permission to have wives accompany the players, even if their expenses were paid by the head of the household. It was generally accepted, however, that friction developed on several of the clubs, due to the petty jealousies of the wives. Mrs. Pitcher would tell Mr. Pitcher that Mrs. Otherpitcher had better clothes than she had and that he was just as good as Mr. Otherpitcher and ought to get just as much money. Some of the wives would insist that their rating in club and social circles should be regulated by the salary of the husbands. Other friction arose. Mrs. Pitcher would tell Mrs. Secondbaseman that her husband would have won his game and drawn closer to his bonus, if Mr. Secondbaseman was not such a rotten player and had not made so many errors. Mrs. Secondbaseman would respond by pointing out that Mr. Pitcher had forced in two runs with bases on balls, and the fight would be on. The situation became so hard to handle that the ban on wives was passed and it caused a lot of trouble. Urban Shocker quit the St. Louis Browns in late season because he could not take Mrs. Shocker to New York on the last trip and threatened to take his protest to the commissioner, but some kind of a compromise was reached.
