No Felicitations Sent
To German President

WASHINGTON, May 12.—No formal message of felicitation was sent by this government today to Field Marshal Paul von Hindenburg upon his inauguration as president of the German republic.

The administration here is anxious that Von Hindenburg, as the lawful choice of the German electorate, be given a fair and unprejudiced chance before the bar of world opinion, but refrains from any gesture which might be misinterpreted as taking sides in the sharp conflict between German republicans and monarchists.

Dynamited Her Hubby
Jealous Woman Admits

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, May 12.—Because she was jealous of her husband, Mrs. R. J. Miles placed six sticks of dynamite under a building in which he was sleeping and fired it, she has confessed to authorities.

Miles was killed in the blast, which occurred yesterday. Shortly before the killing Mr. and Mrs. Miles were taken to the sheriff's office, following a domestic altercation in which Mrs. Miles charged her husband with infidelity. She named another woman as the cause of her trouble.

Monster Stage Is Used
For Kenwood Pageant

The final stages of work on the pageant to be given by the Kenwood school Friday, May 15, have been reached. The last bit of scenery is being finished and the numerous details that accompany such a production are being perfected so that when the curtain rises Friday evening the local people will have a chance to see what Mrs. Veronica Coleman, principal of Kenwood, guarantees to be the best bit of pageantry ever put on by a school in Bend.

The pageant has several features of interest to those who like the bright lights. There are being used a trifle over 8,000 candle power in lights to really make it a "bright light." The stage itself is as large or larger, than those used by the directors of pageants in eastern cities, being 60 feet by 100 feet; the usual size of the average theater stage being considerably less than half that. The "flats" that go to make up the formal background for the production are also over size, six by eight feet.

Several thousand paper flowers have been made to take the place of the "grand drapery" usually seen, so that when the complete setting is assembled the result will truly be a fairy scene.

Nor are the Kenwood teachers relying to any extent on scenery to give their production a great send off. Miss Ione Woods and Miss Agnes Lane have trained over 200 children for the dances and these tiny fairies will perfect the setting built to make them look their best.

Serious Forest Fires
Burning In Minnesota

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 12.—The most serious spring forest fires on record are now burning in Lake, Hubbard and St. Louis counties, according to State Forester Grover M. Consett, who has just returned from an inspection trip north of Duluth.

Consett blamed the blazes on trout fishermen who carelessly abandoned camp fires.

More than 1,000 men today are battling the flames within a radius of 50 miles of Duluth, he said.

BIG CONCESSION

Russian Metal Production Is Aim

Lumber and Water Power Rights On 1,500,000 Acres Are Granted As Well

MOSCOW, May 12.—A concession granted a London corporation for exploitation of 1,500,000 acres containing gold, silver and other metals along the Lena river was explained today by G. Pyatakov, chairman of the chief concessions committee of the Russian government in an interview with the United Press.

The agreement, he said, will bring investment of an important amount of money in basic Russian industries and will increase metal production, favorably influencing Russian currency and exchange. It involves concessions which the soviet government has not hitherto made.

The corporation obtaining the concession is known as the Lena Goldfield, Ltd.

In addition to mining rights, the concessionaires obtain the lumber and water power rights, certain factory buildings and two branch railways in the Lena and Ural districts, as well as compensation for all claims regarding nationalization. They contract to expend a minimum of 22,000,000 rubles in building new factories and introducing machinery and mechanical devices into the Lena district.

The Lena Goldfields concession was negotiated by Walton Lyman Brown, former European director of the American Realty association, Alexander Malozemoff of Oakland, Cal., and Major Frederick Gwynne of London. The Lena is one of the greatest rivers of Asia, largest and most easterly of the streams in Siberia. It has a course of 2,700 miles.

Beginning with a reception given by Cedar Circle No. 8 of The Dalles for incoming delegates last night, a sight seeing trip to Celilo falls on the Columbia river highway was taken at 1 o'clock today, followed by a ritualistic program put on by The Dalles circle in juvenile work.

Will Open Babies' Graves
In Geisen-Volk Farm Probe

NEW YORK, May 11.—In search of evidence against Mrs. Helena Geisen-Volk, "baby farmerette," Assistant District Attorney William P. Ryan will have two tiny unmarked graves opened here today.

Ryan's decision to apply for exhumation orders was reached following new allegations against the founder of the east side "infantorium," where 22 babies have died during the past 16 months.

DEFENSE SUCCEEDS
IN LIMITING CASE

Evidence Against Davis Is Confined to Charge

TOPEKA, Kan., May 12.—With completion of the jury shortly after court opened this morning, the legal battle in which the state is attempting to convict former Governor Jonathan M. Davis of soliciting and accepting a bribe as payment for a pardon, got under way.

Counsel for Davis asked the court to compel the state to confine itself to the charge against Davis, that he solicited a bribe to pardon Walter Grundy, Hutchinson, Kansas, banker, who was sentenced to prison in connection with shortages in the bank.

E. D. Rooney, for the state, cited decisions wherein other cases were admitted along with the specific charge against the defendants.

"Every act and every declaration of everyone connected with a general design is admissible," Rooney contended in his argument.

Davis and Mrs. Davis entered the courtroom early and spoke to friends and acquaintances among the spectators.

The former governor would not comment on the trial, but spoke hopefully of higher prices for farm products.

After both sides had argued for and against admission of evidence concerning acceptance of \$1,250 by the governor's son, Russell Davis, to be used to obtain a pardon, Judge James A. McClure ruled that it was "not competent evidence to try to prove the commission of one crime by offering evidence of the commission of other crimes."

Judge McClure said he did not think it necessary to make a formal ruling at present on the question, but added that in his opening statement to the jury the state was requested not to make any reference to other acts in the case involving his son in which the governor himself was not involved.
