

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, April 25, 1925.

The County Court of Deschutes County met this day, pursuant to adjournment, whereupon the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In the Matter of County Funds—
Upon its appearing to the court that there was now on hand and to be received during the year in the Motor Vehicle Fund and the Road Bonds and Interest Fund sums in excess of the amounts necessary to meet the year's charges for bond interest and the retirement of principal, it was

ORDERED that the County Treasurer be directed to transfer from the Motor Vehicle Fund to the Road Fund the sum of \$4,000; and

ORDERED further that he transfer from all special road funds all available balances to the General Road Fund.

There being no further business to come before the court, adjournment was had until April 28, 1925, at 2 p. m.

BE IT REMEMBERED, that a regular term of the County Court of Deschutes County, in the State of Oregon, was begun and held at the court house in Bend, in said county, on Wednesday, the 6th day of May, 1925, said day being the day fixed by law for the holding of a term of the county court in said county, when were present:

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to wit:

In the Matter of Bond of the Justice of the Peace—
There was then presented the bond

of W. P. Simer, as Justice of the Peace for the Redmond district, and said bond having been found to be in proper form and regular in all respects, it was

ORDERED that said bond be approved and placed on file.

In the Matter of the F. L. Wester Road—
This matter came on to be heard on the viewers' report thereon, and upon its appearing that the viewers' report was unfavorable, and that the viewers recommend that the prayer of petitioners for said road be denied, it was

ORDERED that said petition be denied.

In the Matter of the Establishment of the R. S. Hamilton County Road—
BE IT REMEMBERED, that at a regular term of the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, begun and held at the County Court House in Bend in said county on Wednesday, the 6th day of May, 1925, and continued from day to day thereafter to and including the date of this resolution, the same being a regular term of said County Court sitting for the transaction of county business, and at which time said court may legally, by resolution, establish any county road, the following, among other, proceedings, was had, to wit:

WHEREAS, it is hereby considered that a public necessity exists for the establishment of the road hereinafter described, said court does hereby declare its intention to establish a county road in Deschutes county, Oregon, by resolution, described along the center line thereof as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the George Murphy County Road, where the same intersects the east boundary of Section 17, Township 18 South, Range 12 East of the Willamette Meridian, at a point located approximately 600 feet south from the east quarter corner of said Section 17; thence northerly approximately 2,000 feet; thence westerly for 2,400 feet more or less to a termination in the Dallas-California Highway at or near the south line of the N² of the NE² of said Section 17, said road to be 40 feet in width.

NOW THEREFORE, it is HEREBY ORDERED, that the County Surveyor or his duly qualified deputy, shall give notice of this resolution by posting true copies thereof, properly certified to as such by the County Clerk, at the place of holding county court and also at three public places in the vicinity of said proposed road 30 days previous to the consideration of this resolution by the County Court, notifying all persons concerned that said resolution will be considered and passed upon by this court at its term on the 1st day of July, 1925, at which time the report of the Board of County Road Viewers on said road will be read for the first time, and at which time and until the second reading thereof the court will consider any objections, remonstrances or petitions for damages which may be filed on account of said proposed road.

In the Matter of Claims Against the

County—
Claims against the county were thereupon presented, whereupon it was

ORDERED that said claims be paid by warrants drawn on the various funds of the county, as follows: Claims numbered 1 to 31, inclusive, \$3 to \$5, 37, 38, 40, 42 to 65, inclusive, 66 to 94, inclusive, \$20 to \$125, inclusive, 146, 147 and 149, by warrants drawn on the General Fund of the county; claims numbered 36, 102, 103, 113, 114, 115 to 145, inclusive, on the 1923 Lower Bridge-Terrabonne fund; claims numbered 35, 111, 115 to 117, inclusive, 148, on the Market Road fund; claims numbered 96, 97, 101, 103 to 106, inclusive, 110 and 112 on the General Road Fund.

In the Matter of Auditing of County Records—

There then appeared before the court W. F. Whitley, representing W. F. Whitley & Co., to make application to be employed as Auditor of the County Records for the year 1925, for a price of \$900, said audit to include a semi-annual report as of June 30, 1925, and monthly service thereafter, whereupon upon consideration it was

ORDERED that W. F. Whitley & Co. be employed to audit the County Records for the year 1925 for the sum of \$900, said order to include a semi-annual report as of June 30, 1925, monthly service for the balance of the year, and a final report as of December 31, 1925, payment therefor to be made one-half on the making of the semi-annual report as of June 30, and one-fourth in October, 1925, and one-fourth upon making of annual report as of December 31, 1925.

In the Matter of Wrongful Assessments—

There was then presented to the court affidavits of wrongful assessments made against the Alliance church for the years 1922 and 1923, against Mrs. Mary E. Curtin for the years 1922 and 1923, against Wil-

liam Foss for the year 1924, whereupon it was

ORDERED that such affidavits be placed on file, and that the sheriff be given credit on the tax rolls as indicated, for the amount of taxes due from the said taxpayers on account of such property so wrongfully assessed.

In the Matter of Indigent Aid—

It was then reported to the court that Mrs. Dorothy Freeman of Terrebonne was in indigent circumstances following the recent death of her husband, and that the widow's pension awarded to her was not sufficient for care of herself and children, whereupon it was

ORDERED that the Clerk issue his warrant on the General Fund, payable to said Mrs. Dorothy Freeman, in the sum of \$20 up to and including the month of September, 1925, as indigent aid.

In the Matter of Indigent Aid—

It was then reported to the court that Jerry Haley, an indigent who was in receipt of aid from the county, would be taken care of by Douglas County on being returned to said county, whereupon it was

ORDERED that the Clerk issue his warrant on the General Fund payable to Bend Chapter American Red Cross in the sum of \$17 for use in purchase of transportation and payment of expenses in connection with sending said Jerry Haley to Roseburg.

In the Matter of the Construction of the Crooked River Gap of the Dallas-California Highway in Deschutes County—

WHEREAS, the State Highway Commission desires to proceed with the completion of the Crooked River Gap of the Dallas-California Highway, and

WHEREAS, Jefferson County, Oregon, has agreed to cooperate in the expense of completing that portion of the said Crooked River Gap in Jefferson County to the extent of \$40,000; and

WHEREAS, the State Highway

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
