### Ruling Too Late to Halt First Series

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.) LAHAINA, Maui, T. H., May 12.—There was drama among sailors of the United States fleet today. English plans has stopped the championship boxing bouts to decide the best fisted man in the navy.

A ruling by the attorney general of Washington that the federal house statute prohibits such bouts more here, even though Maui is but a tiny possession and the participants were service men, ended the elimination contests.

District Attorney Charles Parsons of the island secured the ruling from Washington. It is the second time the navy has been denied the right to hold fights on land, the first being at Pearl Harbor, Honolulu.

The bouts will continue aboard ship, although with necessarily lessened attendance.

The ruling came too late to halt the first series, held Monday, in which the scuffling fleet boxers beat the pick of the U. S. S. Seaside and Wyoming.

The number of blue-jackets ashore today was increased to 3,700 week days and 5,500 Sundays. The fact that two sailors from the destroyer Litchfield, not granted shore liberty, slipped into the water and swam half a mile to the beach. They were trying their uniforms when shore police found them.
