

# Giants' Early Season Lead May Mean League Pennant

## HEYDLER SEES OTHER CLUBS

### Not a Single Setup, Says National Chief

NEW YORK, May 14.—With any kind of decent pitching, the New York Giants will be so far ahead in the National league pennant race by the fourth of July that they cannot be caught, many smart baseball men believe. The four time champions are setting better spring pitching now than they have in years, with Jack Scott and Jack Bentley working along with the best in the league. The Giants have everything else, it seems, and with just ordinary pitching they look like the class of the league.

John A. Heydler, president of the National league, is not one of those who believe that the New York club is a cinch and that there will be no contest after mid-season.

"The Giants are a five ball club and they are moving along at a fast pace, but I believe that they will not walk away with the pennant. There are other good clubs in the league that have not started yet," he said.

"The Pittsburgh club ran into a lot of bad weather and was not in good condition to start the race, and the Cincinnati Reds had to play several games with four regulars out of the lineup.

"The showing of the Philadelphia Phillies has been one of the big features of the early season. It is a hustling club that may not be a pennant contender, but it is not going to be easy for any other club. There is really not a setup in the league now. The Boston Braves are a young ball club and they ought to improve as the season advances."

Most of the western ball players who observed the Chicago Cubs said that the club was playing over its head and was bound to take a fall. It looks now that the Cubs have had their fling. They have lost six games in a row and they have not been up against the real strength of the eastern section.

## SPORTSMEN DRAWN BY SALE OF STUD

### Aged Sire of Man O'War to Bring High Price

NEW YORK, May 14.—Prominent horsemen from all over the country are leaving for Louisville today to attend the sale of the former Belmont stud and witness the running of the Kentucky derby on Saturday.

Fair Play, the 29 year old sire of the great Man O' War, is the best known stallion in the stud and it is thought he will bring at least \$75,000 or \$100,000. The other stallions to be sold are the 11 year old Hourless and the five year old Messenger. There are about 65 mares and foals to be sold.

Since so many of the winter favorites started to be withdrawn, speculators have regarded the derby as being an open race, and since the running of the Preakness last week, opinion is stronger than ever that it is anybody's race. This naturally has added to the interest in the classic, the first big event of the summer season, and it, no doubt, will result in a large increase in betting.

Quadrant, the Frederick Johnson colt, which won a number of big events during the winter season, including the Louisiana derby, probably will carry the bulk of eastern money. The Louisiana derby is considered sort of an early test for the Kentucky classic.

Black Gold, winner of the Kentucky derby last year, also finished first in the Louisiana derby.

Kentucky Cardinal, a local pride, will have the south and the middle west all riding him and he may turn out to be the big feature, as he has been working very well in his trials.

## Australia Challenges U.S. Navy Marksmen

LAHAINA, Maui, T. H., May 14.—The crack rifle shots of the navy are tuning up their sight in anticipation of stiff competition ahead.

Some thousands of miles away, at Melbourne, Australia, the best riflemen of that land are awaiting the arrival of Uncle Sam's sharpshooters, members of the division which will visit Australia this summer.

The antipodes riflemen have challenged the navy experts, remembering that they were defeated by the United States shooters in 1908 when the fleet toured the world. The armada is due to leave here Monday on maneuvers, including torpedo and gun practice. The Australian cruise begins from Honolulu about July 1.

Although the fleet is apparently peacefully riding at anchor here, "war" still continues. Submarines continue patrolling, reporting "strange" craft seen from their undersea positions.

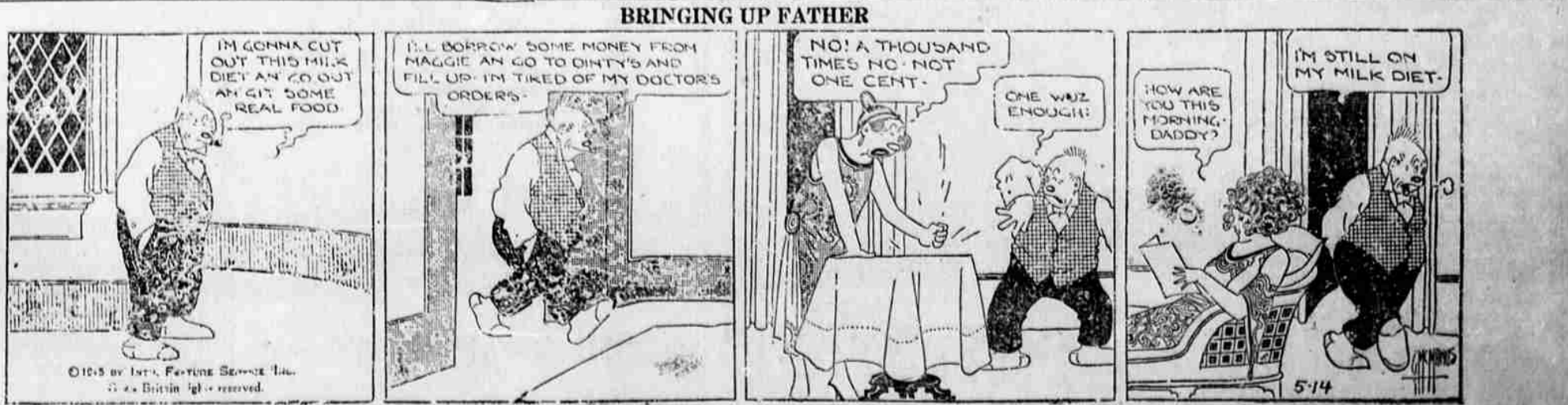
