

Weather Conditions Of The Best For Kentucky Derby

FIELD GROWING IN \$50,000 RACE

Quatrain Favorite, Earl Sande May Be Rider

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 15.—With weather conditions of favorable nature, it is likely a fast track will prevail here Saturday when the \$50,000 Kentucky derby is decided.

The field for the historic turf contest, grows an time for the big race draws closer. There now is a probability that 18 or 19 will go to the post.

The arrival of the H. P. Whitney and Greentree stable horses completed the list of ready derby candidates. The probable lineup in the derby includes these:

Quatrain, Chaney, Backbone, Reminder, Prince of Bourbon, Captain Hal, Almsadel, Ringfoot, Flying Ebony, Lee O. Corner, Kentucky Cardinal, Step Along, Son of John, King Nadi, Chief Cues, Broadway Jones, Needle Gun, Swaps, Boon Companion and Voltale.

Frank Colibetti will ride Voltale; Ambrose will be astride Boon Companion; Ivan Parks will ride Chaney; Brucening or Karl Sande will ride Quatrain; Clarence Turner will ride Son of John, while riders of other horses will be the same as previously announced.

Quatrain still rates favorite at four to one, but he will receive even better support if Karl Sande is given the mount. Sande now is negotiating with Jockey Brucening for the horse.
