

RAIL EXTENSION AID TO FARMER

Effect of Cutoff Work Is Already Seen

Acreage in Potatoes Planted This Spring Double That of 1924

That an extension of the railroad south from Bend, connecting with California and eastern lines, will result in the rejuvenation of the agriculture industry in Central Oregon, is an opinion held by persons who have made a study of market conditions and the prospective outlets for the produce of the mid-state country.

This rejuvenation is no remote possibility, nor a dream of realtors and land owners, for the railroad activity in the Natron cutoff region has already made itself felt in crop production in Deschutes county. It is explained. From such an authority as W. T. McDonald, county agriculturist, comes the information that approximately 100 per cent more early potatoes have been planted, or are being planted, this spring than in former years.

If plans for the proposed rail extension south from Bend are carried out, it is predicted that Central Oregon will come into its own as one of the greatest potato producing centers of the coast. Much of the potato surplus of the mid-state country will find a ready market in California, where hundreds of carloads of potatoes are shipped in each year.

Although more early potatoes are being planted this year, it is estimated by McDonald that the total planting of potatoes will not exceed that of former years.

Potato planting is now well under way in all parts of Deschutes county, reports McDonald.

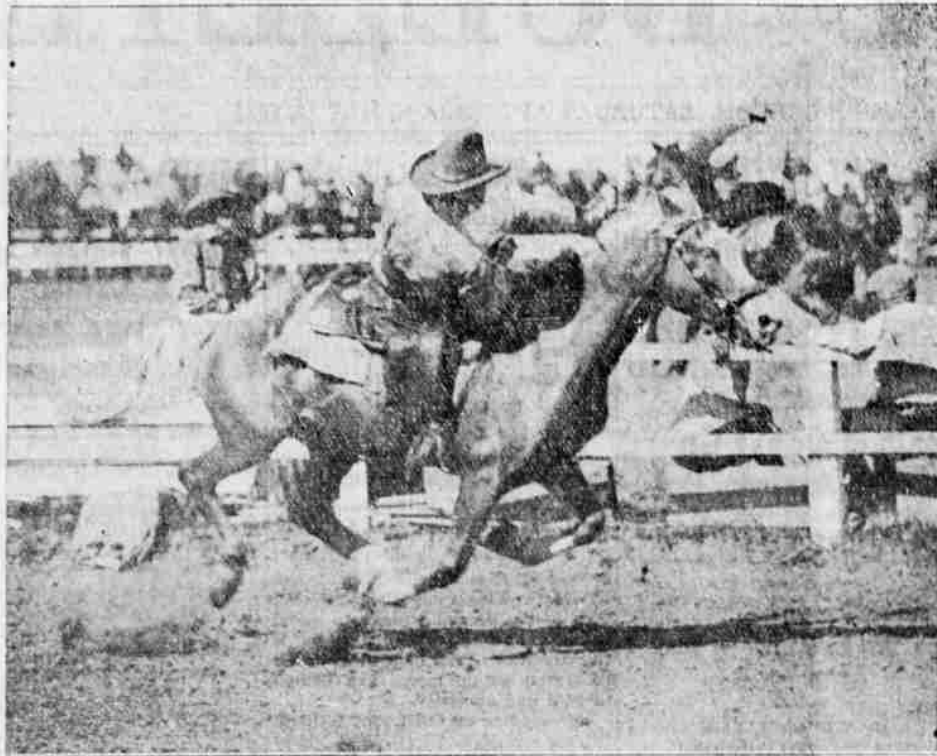
