

# Flying Ebony, Earl Sande Up, Wins Kentucky Derby

## BIGGEST FIELD FACES BARRIER

### Guards Watch Entrants Through Night

CHURCHILL, DOWNER, Louisville, Ky., May 16.—Flying Ebony, a Kentucky horse, and a rank outsider in the betting, won the 51st Kentucky derby here today. Earl Sande rode him to victory.

Captain Hal, eastern entry, after leading in the stretch, was forced to be content with second place, while Son of John came through the run and finished third. Hornemanship won again for Earl Sande, back in the saddle after a long layoff, who had the mount on Flying Ebony and rode a masterly race from start to finish. Quatrain, favorite for the big event, failed to show among the leaders at any time.

Calculations at the track were upset at the last minute when a gust of rain swept over the downs. The sudden change in track conditions may have had something to do with the defeat of Quatrain, Captain Hal and other horses which were highly rated in the betting.

The time for the mile and a quarter was two minutes, seven and two-fifths seconds, considered excellent in view of the sloppy condition of the track.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 16.—The pulse of the turf world quickened to Kentucky derby tempo today as the largest and most colorful crowd in Louisville's history, probably 190,000 persons, gathered for the 51st running of the historic \$50,000 stakes.

The largest field that ever faced the barrier in the classic of the American turf was to go to the post late this afternoon, 25 thoroughbreds having been left after the books closed last night. Two or three scratches today still left the field the largest in Kentucky derby history.

With the possibility of showers, there was an unusual amount of speculation about the chances this year of that group of horses known as the "Mud Larks." The weather was clear this morning, however, and the track fast. Rain that was expected during the night did not fall.

The temperature at 7 a. m. was 55. Frederick Johnson's Quatrain, winner of the New Orleans handicap and the Louisiana derby, was the favorite and it was thought the colt would be backed down to odds of 3 to 1 by post time.

Watched over by vigilant guards, armed with sawed off blizard guns and convenient pieces of lead pipe against the possible machinations of rival stables, the derby entrants all came through the night in good condition and there was lots of money in sight for the thoroughbreds that will oppose Quatrain when the barrier goes up.

Flying Ebony, a stable companion of Coventry, which won the Preakness last week, will carry Earl Sande and the presence of the country's leading jockey astride this black streak will attract much of the derby crowd's currency.

### America Will Oppose Amateur Rule Change

NEW YORK, May 16.—American votes will be cast against any radical changes in the amateur rule, Murray Hulbert, president of the Amateur Athletic union, said today before he sailed on the liner Paris to attend the sessions of the International Olympic committee.

With general Charles S. Sherrill, who is now in Europe, Hulbert will represent the United States at an important series of meetings which are to start in Prague on May 29, with a gathering of the International Amateur Athletic federation. Several foreign nations, it is understood, are willing to support a change in the amateur rule which would permit an athlete to draw compensation at the rate of his daily revenue in private life while he is competing in amateur events. This would mean that an athlete who makes \$10 a day in his profession could draw upon a committee stipend for \$10 a day and his expenses.
