In his lifetime Frank S. Doernbecher was a highly successful manufacturer of furniture in Portland. Dying he provided by his will that a substantial portion of his estate should be devoted to charitable purposes and his son and daughter were directed to designate what that purpose should be.

The legislature appropriated a sum for the maintenance of the hospital, no provision for this purpose having been made otherwise and Governor Pierce stopped the appropriation by a veto.

There is abundant testimony of the need of this hospital in spite of the apparent ample provision for children in existing institutions such as, especially, the Shrine hospital for the crippled.

There could be no finer purpose for a gift. There is no organization with a better right to appeal for it for the purpose intended.
