## SAMMY MANDELL IS TURNED OUT

### No One But Referee Sees Alleged Foul

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, May 19.—With Sammy Mandell, the Rockford, Ill., youngster, out of the lightweight elimination tournament, the search of the New York boxing commission has led into a hole as bad as the old-fashioned blind alley.

Mandell was disqualified last night in the sixth round when Referee Tommy Sheridan sustained the claim of Jimmy Goodrich, Buffalo, that he had been fouled. Sheridan did not even look at Goodrich. No doctor was called and the fight was ended as quickly that few at the ring side knew what it was all about.

There was a lot of talk around town yesterday that Mandell was going to "get the works." Tom Gibbons, who was in Mandell's corner, where the foul blow was said to have been put over, said after the fight that the punch might have been just a little below the belt, but that it did not hurt Goodrich. Mandell said Goodrich jumped up into a left hook aimed for his body. "I don't believe yet that I fouled him," Mandell said.

Eddie Kane, manager of Gibbons and Mandell, would make no statement for publication after the fight, but it is known that he had been tipped off in the afternoon that something might happen. Mandell was making Goodrich look like a novice when Goodrich walked to Mandell's corner and dropped, making motions that he was in terrible pain. Without even a look in his direction, the referee motioned to his seconds to come in and get him and he was dragged to his corner. It looked like there were a little too many dramatics in Goodrich's manifestations of pain. The crowd was stunned as very few—even those with their chins up against the ring—had seen the punch. Mandell had been warned several times in the early rounds for hitting low when the punches were landing high on his opponent's breast.

Just a few more rumors and a few more trick decisions and boxing probably will take a nice ride out of New York.

Goodrich and Benny Valzer, who defeated Solly Seeman last night, remain in the American division, and Stanislaus Loyze and Crin Orlano will meet in the final round in the foreign division.

While the Yanks are tumbling about, being knocked here and there close to the bottom of the league—all the time awaiting the return of their big sledge gun, George Herman Ruth—there are two members of the team who are making things pretty interesting and battling for the flag in East Combs of Kentucky, and Big Ben Paschal of Alabama. Combs is carrying on where he left off last season, playing a whale of a game and batting like a fool, while big Ben is substituting for the fallen Bambino.

Ben is a veteran rookie, being 25 years of age. He is a fully seasoned player and has all the earmarks of a big leaguer. Two or three times he came through with a home run to help win fame for his team after the fashion of his illustrious predecessor. He fields fairly well for a man who doesn't know the carom shots on foreign fields and is a whizz on the bags.

Last season Paschal played 148 games with Atlanta, where he stepped to the plate 578 times and slammed out 197 hits for a total of 319 bases which included 32 doubles, 19 triples and 17 home runs. He scored 136 runs, stole 24 bags and finished with a fine batting average of .341. He also stood fourth among gardeners with a percentage of .977 with 323 put-outs, 24 assists and 8 errors.

Paschal is full of confidence and when he steps to the old platter he defies the pitcher to put it over and try to strike him out. He has a great personality and his pep and enthusiasm keeps the rest of the team all "hopped up." Paschal isn't a Cobb or a Speaker or a super-slugger like the great Bambino, but he'll do—and it will.

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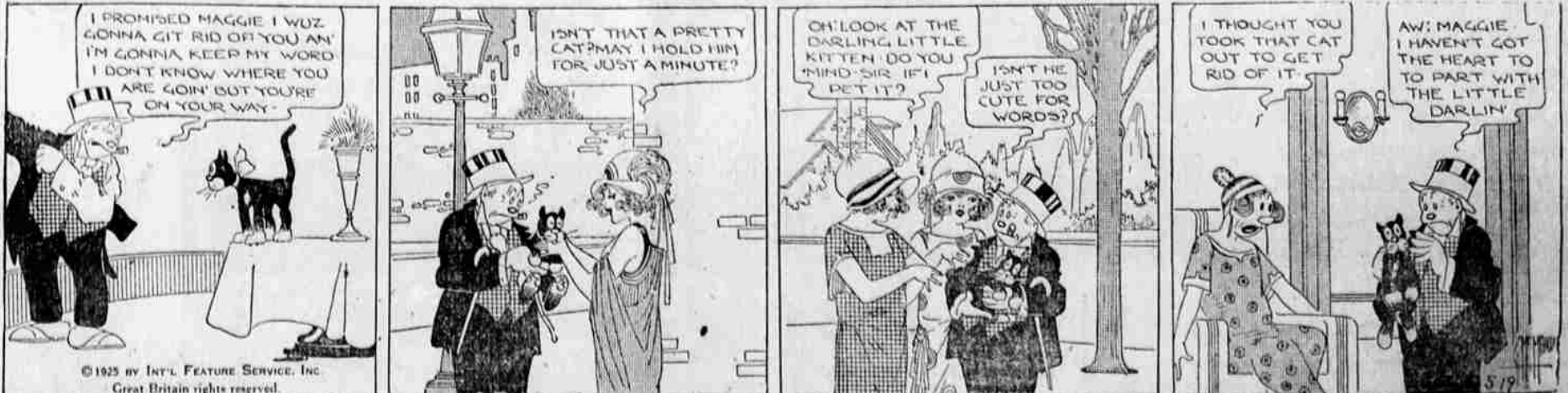
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
