"A certain friendly emulation seems to exist between Bend and Redmond as to which city can boast the greatest number of tin cans and litter adorning portions of the highway in their respective vicinities. Madras is not in a class to qualify with her sister cities in many respects, but in this particular instance she can consider herself well in the race, with a big chance of getting first place.

"The council has seen fit to establish a ruling that each individual be responsible for his own premises, not taking into consideration that there is an unsightly accumulation of rubbish in vacant lots that should be taken care of. A little concerted action on the part of the citizens of Madras would work wonders.

"Why not have a cleanup day, or better, a cleanup week, and make our surroundings more presentable for tourists and others who visit our town?"
