STOCKS MAKING RAPID ADVANCE

Profit Taking Results In Little Change

NEW YORK, May 19.—Speculative enthusiasm gave indications of bolting over again in today's session. Buying operations attained an urgency not witnessed since last winter's feverish trading subsided the last of February. Further sensational advances took place in Mack Truck, Dupont, Utah Securities, American Can and other high grade stocks, imparting additional momentum to the upward tendency recently displayed by the general list.

Practically every section of the list participated in the day's bullish demonstration. Washash shares were the outstanding features of the rails, due to the expectation that the road will be taken over by the Delaware & Hudson on a guaranteed dividend basis. Public utilities were inspired by Utah Utilities' impressive example, and the whole market maintained a buoyant tone which was not greatly impaired by the profit taking which cropped out in the later afternoon.

COLLEGES WAIT BOARD RULING

Duplicate Courses May Be Eliminated

Partial Agreement Reached But Other Departments Yet to Be Decided

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.)
PORTLAND, May 19.—Outcome of the rivalry between the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural College in offering certain duplicate courses hung in the balance today as the board of higher curricula prepared to study the evidence and briefs submitted at yesterday's hearing.

The board took the matter under advisement yesterday after some signs of a settlement between the faculties of the two schools appeared.

Dean Colin V. Dymont of the university's school of literature, science and the arts, and Dean M. E. Smith of the school of basic arts and sciences at O. A. C. announced they had agreed on a compromise on courses to be offered in the departments under their jurisdiction. This briefly provided that O. A. C. should offer no bachelor degree in any of the 12 departments in the school of basic arts and sciences.

It was also announced that compromises appeared likely in the respective schools of commerce and education. Matters pertaining to duplications in work in journalism, music and physical education, were still unsettled.

Dr. C. J. Smith, chairman of the board, estimated that it would take several weeks before the board could arrive at a conclusion as to the merits of the controversy.

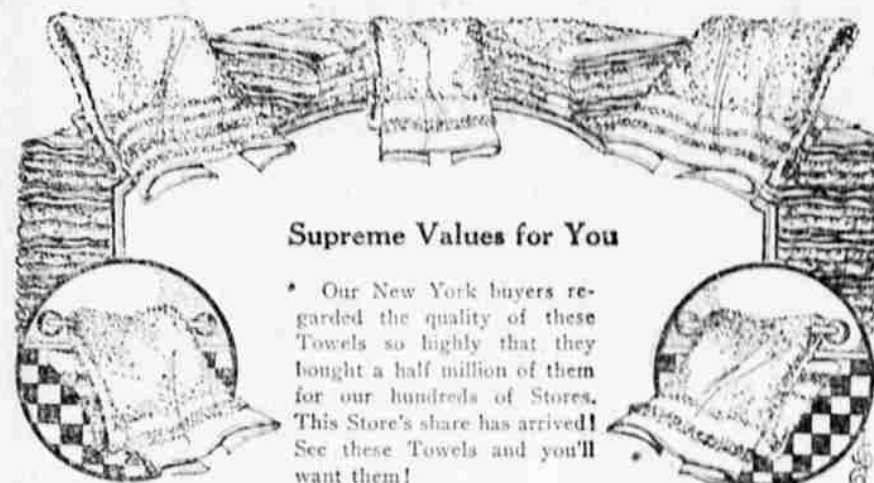
