Bryan Brings Strife In Church Into Open

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 20.—William Jennings Bryan today brought into the open the undercurrents of factional strife which have been threatening the solidarity of the national assembly of the Presbyterian church, beginning here tomorrow.

Bryan jumped into the thick of pre-assembly conferences, sponsoring a resolution which may throw the fundamentalist-modernist row within the church onto the open floor of the assembly.

The resolution provides minority reports of the permanent judicial commission, to which all troublesome matters are referred, may be presented for action on the floor. The resolution was adopted by the general council of the church this afternoon and is assured, leaders said, of adoption by the assembly.

THE DALLES, May 20.—Sharply contrasting the rainfall record of last May when not enough moisture was measured to make a trace on the weather charts, 35 of an inch precipitation here last night and today brought the total for this month up to 1.13 inches. The records of five years back show not more than .36 of an inch for 1921 and 1923, .91 for 1922 and .97 for 1920 during the month of May in the respective periods.
