Instructors Mimicked by Graduating Class

Program At Assembly Features Daily Happenings In Office of Principal

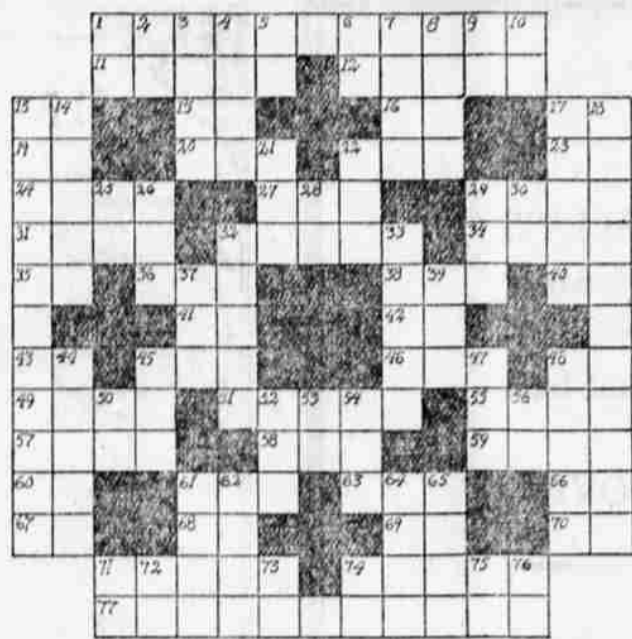

Ralph Hallyburton, who has been spending the past few months with his brother, R. G. Hallyburton of Powell Butte, left Friday for The Dalles for a short visit.

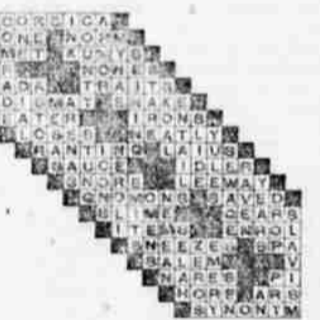
