

# Nurmi-Helffrich Race Is Puzzler To Experts Of Track

## FLYING FINN FEELS TIRED

### May Have Burnt Himself Out, He Fears

NEW YORK, May 21.—Athletic students of form seldom have found such a problem to solve as that to be presented in the Yankee stadium next Tuesday night when Paavo Nurmi, the world's champion long distance runner, meets Allan Helffrich, one of the best middle distance runners in the world, in a half mile race.

There is no question that Nurmi is one of the greatest runners that ever lived and Helffrich is perhaps the best half miler developed in this country since the days of Ted Meredith. The problem is to determine the form over the short route, the case being similar to a match between Babe Ruth, the champion slugger of baseball and Tris Speaker, the king of two base hitters. If they were to meet in a double hitting contest, Nurmi can run short distances. He is famed here chiefly for distances over the mile and it is not generally known that he is the sprint champion of Finland. That doesn't mean so much, however, as the Finns are not a sprinting race.

There is some question now about Nurmi's form and it is probable that Helffrich will go to the mark as the favorite or at least as an even choice. Nurmi said yesterday at the park where he is training that he did not feel quite sure of himself and that he was not certain that he had not burnt himself out.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 21.—No evidence has been found which would justify bringing charges against ex-Governor Louis F. Hart in connection with the Tacoma bank fees case, Roscoe Fullerton, prosecuting attorney of Thurston county, said today in a letter addressed to Attorney General Dunbar.

"I beg to advise you that I have investigated the matter and have reached the conclusion that there are no justifiable grounds for instituting any proceedings against Hart in Thurston county."

Fullerton refused to disclose the nature of charges or the contents of affidavits presented to him for investigation. The matter related to exorbitant fees claimed by Tacoma lawyers in relation to the liquidation of the affairs of the Scandinavian-American Bank of Tacoma.
