GENERAL LIST OF STOCKS UP

Volume of Dealings Accompanies Rise

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
 NEW YORK, May 21.—Private movements in today's session afforded multiplying indications that the recent drastic decline in the general list was merely a secondary reaction in a big bull market and that the general list had definitely entered a fresh phase of the primary advance. Singularly enough, the strongest proof to this effect was supplied by the reactionary tendency which developed in Mack Truck, Utah Securities, American Can and other high priced stocks which led the constructive demonstration earlier in the week.

Despite the substantial character of the recession which took place in various sections of the list, reaching their maximum in the 19 point drop experienced by Utah Securities, the volume of dealings maintained a two million share pace and the marked broadening tendency which the trading displayed carried operations for the rise in vigorous fashion into a wide variety of specialties and into many issues, particularly the oils and public utilities, which here tofore had been comparatively quiet.

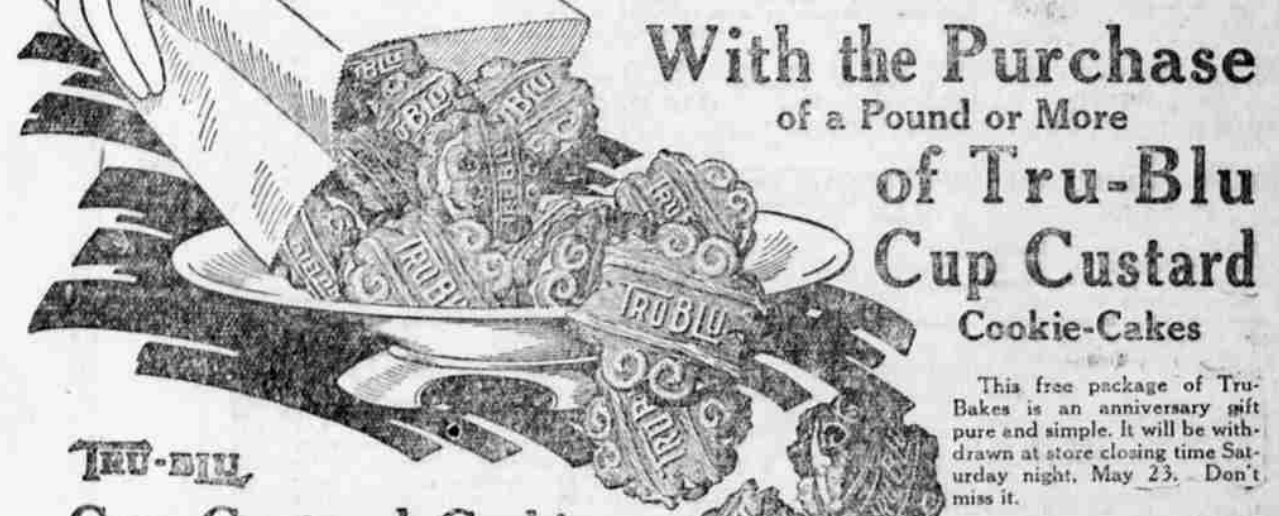
