Celebration Given Up for Legion Convention

POST TAKES VOTE

Subscriptions of \$135 At Meeting Start Doern- becher Endowment

In view of the fact that a celebration is to be held in Prineville in connection with the state convention of the American Legion, June 25, 26, and 27, no Fourth of July celebration will be held in Bend by the local post of the legion this year. It was decided at the regular meeting of the post last night. Another matter taken under consideration was the American Legion and Doernbecher hospital endowment campaign.

After deciding that the Bend post of the legion should not sponsor a July 4 celebration in Bend, the following resolution was approved: "In view of the fact that this post has pledged itself to take a responsible part in the carrying on of the state convention in Prineville, and has numerous duties in connection therewith, and as the convention, with a general celebration, is being held in Prineville but a few days previous to July 4, we do not feel it advisable to assume the responsibility of taking charge of a July 4 celebration this year."

Aid Is Offered

"However, if the merchants' association, or other bona fide organizations of Bend, find it advisable to have a celebration on the Fourth, we will appoint proper committees to cooperate in a minor capacity." Frank R. Prince headed the committee that drew up the resolution.

Legionnaires attending last night's meeting started the endowment campaign by subscribing \$135 in a very short time. Considering the fact that the number of legion men attending the meeting was few, John A. Runge, commander, believes the amount of the subscription is commendable. Carl A. Johnson was named chairman of the endowment campaign in Bend yesterday. Bend's quota is \$1,100.

North Believed Conquered From Air First Time

Report Says During Norwegian Explorer Already On Way Back From Coldest Point

LONDON, May 22.—The Central News carried a dispatch from Oslo, Norway, this afternoon, saying that an unconfirmed report from King's bay says Captain Roald Amundsen has reached the north pole and is now en route back to his base.

The dispatch adds that the King's bay correspondent of the Central News has not yet been able to confirm the report.

The north has been conquered from the air for the first time in the world's history, it reports from Spitzbergen to the United Press today are true.

Captain Roald Amundsen, descendant of venturesome world rovers and himself conqueror of the south pole, was reported in King's bay messages, still unconfirmed, to have reached the peak of the universe by his airplane expedition, which includes, in a second plane, Lincoln Ellsworth, American. The reports further claimed he was already on his way back to base in the frozen fjord at Spitzbergen.

Beaten In Church, Bryan Goes Back to Evolution

Not a Comedy Skit, Commoner Hastens to Affirm, Scoring Scientists With Whom He Disagrees

(By United Press Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
COLUMBUS, O., May 22.—Pushed into the background of Presbyterian assembly affairs by a complete victory of younger men, William Jennings Bryan, 65, lacking somewhat in the physical vigor of former years, turned his attention today to the impending test case of evolution at Dayton, Tenn.

Bryan said he had just received a letter from the law firm of Hicks and Hicks accepting his services as associate counsel in the prosecution of John T. Scopes, accused of violating the new Tennessee law against teaching the theory of evolution.

"I will go to Dayton as soon as the case is called for trial," the commoner said. "It is by no means a comedy skit. Christian people everywhere know that this trial is going to answer the most important question before the American people."

"Who is going to control our school system—a minority of pseudo-scientists or a real Christian majority?"

Bryan declared that although the election of Dr. Charles R. Erdman of Princeton university as moderator of the Presbyterian assembly was a personal defeat for him, it was nevertheless a great victory for the younger fundamentalists.

The commoner said he was "not the least bit interested" in the charges of Clarence Darrow, former criminal lawyer, planning to aid the defense in the Scopes trial, that he is a "witch burner."

"I know Darrow very well," Bryan declared, "but I don't care to deal in personalities."

"The fact is that the merits of evolution may never come up in this trial at all. The question is, who is going to control our school system?"

"Do you believe there is a conflict between science and the Bible?" Bryan was asked.

"No, I do not," he replied. "The conflict is between the guesses of scientists and the Bible. There can be no conflict between real truths. We object to having these guesses of science taught as truths. Not one man in 10 is a scientist and yet this minority is trying to control our schools."

"There are between two and three million different species of animal life and yet scientists who have never been able to trace a connection between any two of these species presume to say that man sprang from one of them."

"The Bible," he declared, "proves itself. Both nature and the Bible have God back of them."

SURVEY NEAR PASS

Strahorn Engineers Close to Entrance Point Coveted By Oregon Trunk

KLAMATH FALLS, May 22.—Charles H. Carey, Portland, counsel for the Oregon Trunk railway, this morning met with heads of every civic organization here, including the chamber of commerce and the Klamath irrigation district, seeking support for entrance of the Hill lines into Klamath Falls.

Surveyors of the Oregon, California and Eastern railroad, suddenly taken from their work on the proposed Strahorn road from Klamath Falls to Lakeview, have virtually finished their new surveys and are within a few miles of the much coveted narrow pass at the head of the Williamson river. It was learned this morning. It is this pass that the Hill line plans to use in entering the Klamath country. The pass is of further import because within its immediate vicinity is 13 square miles of good timber, recently purchased by the Long-Bell Lumber Company.

The territory being surveyed by the O. C. and E. is identical for some miles with that to be surveyed by the Oregon Trunk engineers, now working out of Bonanza.

GIRL TO DENY MURDER STAIN

Dorothy Claims La Marr Killed Mother

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Dorothy Ellingson, brought back to San Francisco as sane to face trial for killing her mother, today dispelled rumors that she would enter a plea for guilty.

"Every word in my statement is true," she declared as she left Napa. "Jimmy La Marr killed my mother."

If given an opportunity, Dorothy will plead guilty to the charge, she is said to have admitted at Napa last night. Such action would have to be with her father's consent.

"I want to plead guilty and have it over with quick," the titan haired defendant is reported to have urged.

Dorothy is due to reach San Francisco about 2:30 p. m., brought from Napa by automobile in custody of Mrs. Gussie Kennedy, jail matron, who guarded her during the insanity trial.

MURDERERS DIE AT END OF ROPE; PROPHET WRONG

Coquille Cripple Carried to Gallows

FARMER IS HANGED

Stars and Moonshine Responsible for Crimes— Killers Both Calm

SALEM, May 22.—Arthur Covell, 47 year old astrologer of Coquille, was carried to the gallows at the Oregon penitentiary, too crippled to walk, and hanged for the murder of his sister in law.

The trap was sprung at 8:20 a. m., sending him to his death.

Covell's neck was not broken when he dropped from the trap and death resulted from strangulation. He was not pronounced dead until 26 minutes after he was hanged.

Covell's hanging was the second of a double execution today, following that of L. W. Pearce, a Coos county rancher who slew his wife and a neighbor while drunk on moonshine.

Covell was rolled into the death chamber on a wheel chair and strapped to a board as the noose was placed about his neck.

"I wish everybody well," he said. "I bear no ill feelings towards anyone. Goodbye, everybody," he declared in his last statement.

Pierce Refuses Pardon

Covell said nothing about his sentence of the stars that led him to his doom. In a confession he made soon after the slaying, he said he killed his brother's wife because "the stars directed it."

Up to last night he kept faith in his stars, which told him in his horoscope that he would not die on the gallows. His faith was broken in his astral science, however, last night, when Governor Pierce refused to pardon him.

Neither Covell nor Pearce ate any breakfast before going to their deaths; but they each faced their execution without faltering.

When the trap was sprung for Pearce at 7:55 a. m., a wound in his throat, inflicted when he attempted to commit suicide in the Coos county jail, opened.

"Don't be afraid to get the rope tight," Pearce said as a deputy warden adjusted the noose. "I want to die quick."

His death came in 11 minutes.

FIGHT REFERENDUM ON MOTOR BUS TAX

Copies of Resolution Sent By Bend Commercial Club

BEND, Ore., May 22.—Explaining that if the proposed referendum is invoked and truck companies will not be forced to pay for nearly two years the increased fees approved by the state legislature at its recent session, the Bend Commercial club today is sending a resolution to various parts of the Central Oregon country, asking voters to refuse to sign the petitions to refer the legislative enactment. The resolution follows:

"Whereas we are aware that the bus and truck companies operating on the highways of Oregon are circulating a petition to refer to the people for vote in November, 1926, house bill No. 413, which was passed by the last legislature for the purpose of securing increased license fees from said bus and truck companies in order to recuperate the state in part for the damage they are doing to improved highways, and

"Whereas if sufficient petitioners are secured to refer this bill the result will be that the bus and truck companies will not be compelled to pay these increased fees for nearly two years although they will continue the damage and destruction they are now doing to our public highways, and

"Therefore, be it resolved that we believe it is to the best interest of the state and all communities that all roads be preserved unless those using them render fair compensation for the damage they do;

"Therefore, be it resolved that we believe it is to the best interest of this community that this bill be not referred and we respectfully ask all citizens to refuse to sign these petitions to refer this bill."
