

TO USE BABIES IN EXPERIMENT

Devolution Theory May Be Proved

Scientists Would Learn If Pickaninies Will Revert to Ape Type

BERLIN, May 22.—An impending German scientific expedition into East Africa intends to solve the question: "Do humans revert to animal types if they develop without contact with their man kind?"

While William Jennings Bryan in America is fighting out the battle against the evolution theory, Rudolph Reikardt, author and soldier of fortune, intends to test out whether there is a counter evolution—or reversion to type—under certain conditions.

Before setting forth to Delagoa bay, Portuguese East Africa, this autumn, he plans to go to America, hoping there to recruit one or two American scientists for his bizarre venture.

Reikardt will experiment on negro babies. Until adolescence they will have no contact with others of their kind and their every move will be checked in the name of science.

In a lonely spot along the coast, 12 made in Africa pickaninies will be taken from their mothers' breasts and completely isolated. Corralled in a little settlement, technically equipped for the unusual experiment and safeguarded against accidents and illness, they will be "devolution analyzed."

Unlike the Simian tarzan, they will not even have the companionship

of apes. Language Origin Sought Reikardt wants to find out if these babies thus isolated will develop a spoken or sign language, whether they will invent tools and spontaneously discover the products of modern civilization; or whether they will regress to the stage of apes or the level of cave men.

Will they remain mentally and spiritually dwarfed? Or will they at least rise to the level of the East Africans? The answer to these questions, Reikardt believes, will be of value not only to evolutionists but to psychologists the world over.

After that period of test, these "specimens" will be brought into contact with modern civilization and provision will be made for taking care of them.

Reikardt intends to establish his "incubator colony" on a coast plateau, separating the experiment station from dwellings of the scientists by several hundred yards. He has arranged for special observation posts around the baby enclosure which will resemble the old American block houses. There, with the aid of special mirrors, dictaphones and movie cameras, the observers will be able, day and night, to observe the babies' movements. A long mechanical arm will be devised for reaching out and shifting the babies from time to time.

ANGER GROWING IN COAL FIELDS

Rival Organizations War To Extermination

Wholesale Trials On Contempt of Court Charges Put Off Until Tuesday

FAIRMOUNT, W. Va., May 22.—A series of bitter demonstrations whipped up a fury in the coal fields today as 134 union workers went on trial here charged with attempting to interfere with operations of non union mines.

Upon the decision of the court virtually rests the outcome of the war, to which both sides now see an end only in extinction of the United Mine Workers' organizations or the North-western Virginia operators.

The men are charged specifically with contempt of court for violating a stringent injunction issued by Circuit Court Judge W. S. Meredith restraining them from being in the presence of non union workers on the ground their presence is intimidation.

Despite the restrictions of the injunction, union leaders proceeded with their picketing plans, staging demonstrations against non union workers.

Upon plea of defense attorneys, Judge Meredith decided to postpone hearings of the evidence until Tuesday. This delay was asked to enable additional defense counsel to be present.

An answer to the charges specifically denying them was filed with the court and argued, however.
